MRS. CUSACK DISCHARGED.

A Great Surprise in the Arson Case.

A sensation was caused in the St. John Circuit Court, by the discharge of Mrs. Cusack on account of the crown officer entering a *nolle prosequi*. When Mr. George E. Fairweather, insurance agent, gave his evidence it came out that he had settled the insurance claim against his company in the interval between the preliminary examination of Mrs. Cusack and the trial which has just now so unexpectedly ended. Thereupon the Attorney General remarked that this company had been the one against which the offence charged upon the prisoner operated. The company had been represented at the preliminary examination by counsel. Under these circumstances it would be very difficult to convict a prisoner who was charged with such an offence when the parties against whom the fraud was alleged to have been committed came in and settled the matter, and he thought a *nolle prosequi* should be entered. His Honor agreed with the view of the Attorney General and thought this was the proper proceeding. He stated that the accused would therefore go out a free woman. Mr. Mullin then spoke earnestly in behalf of his client. He stated that Mrs. Cusack would go out of the court house without a stain on her reputation. She had come there prepared to prove her innocence and was still prepared so to do. In the theory of law every accused person was innocent until proved guilty, and the crown by abandoning the case against Mrs. Cusack admitted her innocence.

The prisoner was accordingly discharged and the court adjourned until to-morrow morning. The reason for the crown abandoning the case is that the crown officer deems it impossible to get a jury to convict the prisoner, in view of the fact that the insurance company against whom the wrong really operated settled the insurance.

Speaking to a reporter, Mr. Fairweather pointed out that he never had anything to do with the prosecution of the case. He did not lay the information and had nothing to do with it. The first knowledge he had of the preliminary examination was when one morning he read in a paper that it would take place that day. He attended with his counsel, Dr. Alward, to watch the proceedings in behalf of his company, the London & Lancashire Fire Insurance Company, and Dr. Alward stated to the court most emphatically on two occasions that he appeared only to watch the proceedings.


