A Noted Criminal.

Boston, Nov. 29.—The news contained in the despatch from Dover, N. H., that Julius McArthur, the murderer of Deputy Smith, has been captured in Willimantic, Ct., was received by the police of this city as tidings of great joy. They knew McArthur. That is they knew of him, and about two years ago made a desperate effort to catch him when he was located in this city. He made his escape, however, and they heard nothing of him in the meantime until they read in the morning the announcement of his arrest. McArthur has a terrible criminal record. He was born about forty years ago in Albert county, N. B., and at the age of 9 years showed some of the criminal propensities which have lately distinguished him, by clipping the ears of the neighbors' horses. A few years later he took up his residence in St. John, and while there experienced religion. He afterwards studied for the ministry, and was regularly ordained in the Baptist church. Shortly after his ordination he showed a liking for horse-flesh, and evinced a strange sort of forgetfulness in returning his animals after he had hired them. This forgetfulness caused him to jump over the border into the state of Maine. Here he again established himself as a preacher, but his crooked work in different directions made that part of the country also too hot for him and in 1872 he established himself in East Boston. His record in this state is as black as that which he left behind him in New Brunswick, Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont. He is well known at the Massachusetts state prison where he has spent nine years of his life, although at this institution he was registered as John Arthur Simpson, which is his right name. On the night of Aug. 3, 1879, the barn of Benj. Freeman of Taunton, was entered and the horse was taken from it. There had been two or three cases of this kind in that neighborhood and suspicion pointed towards Simpson. It was some days before he was discovered. Then a Boston police inspector found him at a relative's home in East Boston. He was indicted, and Sept. 10, 1879, was sent to state prison for six years. He was next heard of in Lawrence in 1887, where he opened a millinery store. About 6 o'clock one night this store was discovered to be on fire and the stock was about entirely destroyed. Simpson collected a large amount of insurance, and was then arrested for incendiarism. He established an alibi, however, and was discharged. Later he returned to Chelsea, where he had a fancy goods store, and found a neighbor in the millinery business named Mrs. M. A. McCarthy. She was a Roman Catholic, and he, claiming to belong to the same faith, made love to her and married her in 1887. Shortly afterward, Chief of Police Sibley arrested Simpson for breaking and entering his store and stealing \$600 of goods. But this case was eventually discharged by a jury. While looking up Simpson's record in connection with the latter case, the police received word from Fredericton, N. B., that Simpson had one wife living there, and when the charge of breaking and entering failed they arrested him on a charge of bigamy, and on Sept. 13, 1888 he was sentenced to three years imprisonment in the Massachusetts penitentiary. It was shortly after leaving this place that the New Hampshire murder occurred for which he is now under arrest. After leaving the state prison at Charlestown, he went to Vermont and stole a horse and carriage belonging to Dr. Kendall of Enosburg Falls. He was followed by Deputy Sheriff Smith, who overtook him near Farmington, N. H. The sheriff tried to arrest the man, but McArthur pulled out a revolver and fired a shot at the sheriff, from the effects of which the latter died a few days afterward. McArthur fled the state at once and came to Massachusetts. He spent a day here in Boston, and was often located at Lynn, Reading and Andover. The police of Boston and neighboring towns and cities made a determined effort to catch him at that time, but failed. His picture is in the rogue's gallery at police headquarters. McArthur's right name is John Arthur Simpson. He has been known as George Simpson, and as George A. Stillwell. The name McArthur he adopted when he was arrested for the murder of Deputy Sheriff Smith, and placed in the Dover jail, from which he escaped after a few days' confinement.

DOVER, N. H., Nov. 29.—The announcement that the murderer Julius H. McArthur had been arrested at Willimantic, Ct., caused the greatest excitement here that city Saturday corresponded very closely with that of McArthur. The Stafford county officials are satisfied that the man arrested is the much wanted murderer of Sheriff Smith. A photograph was taken of him Friday at Willimantic. The man was on Friday taken to Rutland, Vt., where he is wanted for horse stealing and for stealing a special delivery letter.

There is a reward of \$1,100 for the capture of McArthur, \$1,000 having been offered by the state and \$100 by Jailer Libby, from whose custody the prisoner escaped.

RUTLAND, Vt., Nov. 29.—Rev. Henry Clay Steele, with many aliases, was brought to this city Friday from Willimantic, Ct. He was wanted here for stealing a team in Middletown Springs, but was arraigned for violating the postal laws by detaining

and opening a letter entrusted to him to deliver in Middletown Spring, Saturday 18th inst. At one o'clock Saturday morning the court held him for the United States grand jury in \$1,000 on the charge.
