SUDDEN DEATHS.—Mr Hugh Dysart, of Cocagne, one of Kent's best known citizens died suddenly at his residence on Friday night. It appears that Mr. Dysart had been indisposed for the past few days and rising in the night took some medicine, was killed by an overdose, dying five minutes after the medicine was taken. Deceased was about 60 years old.

Mrs. Thomas Frecker died very suddenly at her residence, Richibucto, on Monday evening. Although she had been ailing for some time, deceased was able to be about as usual on Monday and her sudden taking off was a great shock to her friends. Shortly after having partaken of the evening meal she was taken suddenly ill, and her brother, Mr. Donnelly McDermott, hastily summoned Dr. I. W. Doherty but medical skill could do nothing for her and she expired a few moments after the doctor's arrival. Death was caused by paralysis of the brain.

A sudden death took place in Main River last week. Robert Lawson, who was unmarried and lived with his father, complained on Thursday week of being unwell, but nothing serious was apprehended. Dr. Ferguson was called and did everything to alleviate his sufferings. These, which were occasioned by an abscess in the stomach, continued to increase till Monday morning when they terminated fatally. He was a young man of the highest moral character and was held in the greatest esteem. His sudden death has cast a gloom over the whole community. His funeral, which was largely attended, took place on Wednesday. The service at the house and in St. Andrew's church yard were conducted by Rev. Wm. Hamilton.

—A man one time a good thing had which people would have prized, But he never sold a single one, For he never advertised.

—A meeting of those interested in the lobster fisheries is to be held in Moncton on Friday, the 21st instant. Prof. E. E. Prince, Commissioner of Fisheries, will be present on behalf of the department.

—The Methodists of Molus River are going to have a Basket Social in the School house on Thursday evening, 27th inst. Music, &c. will be furnished by the choir of the Methodist Church of Richibucto.

—At a meeting of the members of the late Sir John Thompson's Government it was decided that the condition of Lady Thompson and her family were such as to justify them in asking for a national subscription to create a fund for the support of Lady Thompson and her family.

—A thaw set in on Wednesday evening last which continued the week. As a consequence, there was a stagnation in the smelt trade. Packers as well as some of the fishermen had large quantities on hand, Monday was as mild as a September day, and the channel was cleared of ice. That night, however, set in cold and there is a better feeling. Yesterday some old stock of fish sold at 1/2 cent per lb.

—On account of the tea and fancy sale in Kingston, Thursday evening, it has been thought advisable to postpone the public meeting re the lighting of our streets until Saturday evening, 22nd inst., then to meet at the court house at 7 o'clock, when we hope to see a large attendance to consider this important question. The enquiry committee will make report of location, probable cost, &c. Make no mistake, at the court house, Saturday evening.

—It was a grand idea of the young Czar to furnish a wedding dinner in honor of his marriage to 40,000 of the St. Petersburg poor. It is also the best possible tactics on his part to show full confidence in his people by traversing the streets without any guard or defence except the respect and affection of those over whom he rules. If only Nihilists and Anarchists show some glimmering of reason and good sense! Very many acts of clemency have been shown in connection with the Czar's marriage.

—The Miramichi lumber trade appears to be improving. Shipments for the season of 1894 amounted to 36 million feet the largest since 1884, with the single exception of 1889. The shipments in 1893 amounted to 33 millions, in 1891 to 72 millions, in 1890 to 88 millions, while in 1889 there were 110 millions, in 1888, 73 millions and in 1887, 68 millions. The largest shippers this year were W. M. McKay, who loaded 28 vessels of 28,250 tons, with 28,447,797 feet deals, etc.; J. B. Snowball, 40 vessels, 28,059 tons, 24,506,837 feet deals, etc.; D. & J. Ritchie & Co., Ernest Hutchinson, F. E. Neate, Geo. Burchill & Sons, and Wm. Richards being the other principal shippers.

—Montreal papers say that the Bank of Montreal has been asked to open a branch in St. John's, Newfoundland.

—Prof. R. A. March, of St. John, favored the guests of the Kent Hotel on Tuesday evening with a fine musical treat.

—One of our citizens remarked the other day that "the first man to cross the river on the ice this season was Jim Flanagan's dog."

—Another prize fighter has been killed. Andy Bowen died at New Orleans, on Saturday morning from the effects of a knock out blow given him by Lavigne in their fight the previous night.

—A British resident in Pekin says the feeling against foreigners is increasing in bitterness, and he feels convinced that when the Japanese come within sight of the capital every foreigner will be massacred.

—The French Republic has during the last four years been gradually decreasing both the number of troops and military expenditure, the estimates for that branch of service being now some \$20,000,000 less than they were in 1891.

—The Moncton Times says "if money were wanted for legitimate investment in Canada it could not be got." This seems rather rough on Canada and Canadians. The enterprising directors of the Times Printing Company, Messrs. Powell, Higgins, and Cole, were not at all backward in advancing the needful to form that company, which we presume is a "legitimate investment."

—Bishop Rogers had a narrow escape from drowning while crossing the Miramichi river at Nelson on Sunday last. The ice suddenly gave way and the horses went under, the sleigh remaining on the ice for a moment when it, too, followed, taking with it the bishop, who is a very stout man and was heavily clothed, as he was about to step on the ice. The driver who had got on the ice, now lay down and grasped the bishop's hand, and the latter bade him to simply hold on until help arrived. A rope and some other facilities were brought from the shore by persons who witnessed the accident, and after being nearly half an hour in the water his lordship was assisted out. He went to the residence of John O'Brien, M. P. P., where he remained for an hour or two, and was then driven home to Chatham, apparently little the worse for his experience. The horse and sleigh were lost.

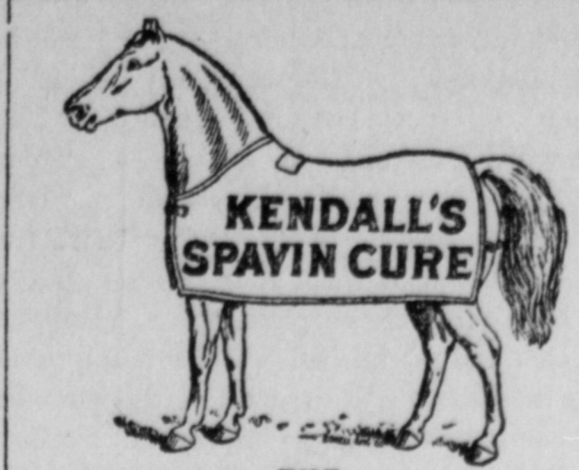

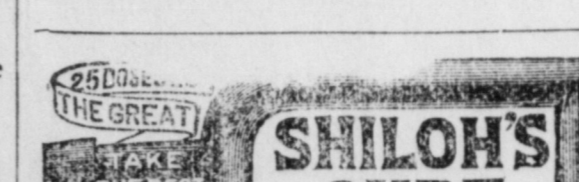

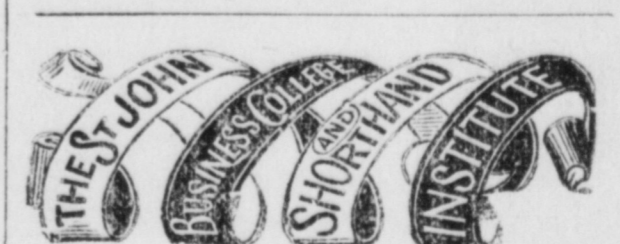
