LET THERE BE LIGHT.—THE REVIEW has from time to time pointed out the necessity for providing some kind of lights for the streets of Richibucto. —The Dominion Safety Fund Life Assurance Association, of St. John, has given notice of its intention to apply to the minister of finance for a release of its assets and securities.

—Palo Alto, California, was recently incorporated, and has provided that each deed shall contain a clause stipulating that no liquor shall be sold on the premises, under penalty of forfeiting the land.

—It is reported that the Chinese have made a practice of killing their Japanese prisoners and horribly mutilating their remains, and that in retaliation no quarter was given to the Chinese at Port Arthur.

—K. N. R. will run a special train for the accommodation of those who wish to attend the entertainment at St. Louis, on December 8th. Leaving Kingston station at 6 p. m., will return at 10 o'clock, same evening.

—The Chatham World says that smelt fishing at that place has so far been very poor. Only small hauls have been made and half the fish are tom cods, and the smelts are small in size. One man got a 13½ pound salmon in his net.

Messrs. John Leet and Solomon Allan, of West Welford, visited the shiretown Saturday.

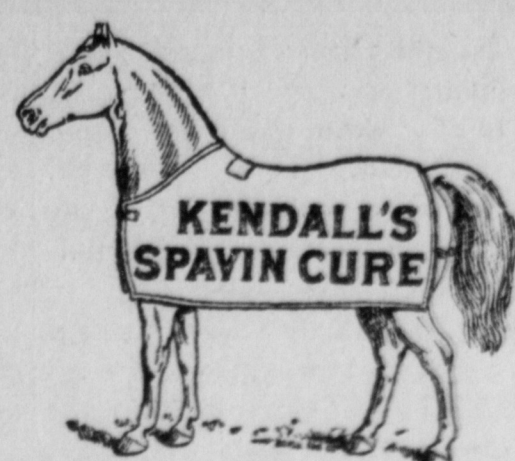
