—Mr. J. L. Graham of South Branch left last week for Minocqua, Wisconsin. He intends remaining there two years, after which he will return and settle on the old place in South Branch.

—Ex-conductor B. S. Smith, and engineer White of the B. & M. Railway, were in town Monday. They attribute their dismissal from the service of the road to the influence of a certain Buctouche gentleman who, they say has been trying for some time to get them displaced.

—The remains of Neil McIntosh who died at Amherst last week were brought to Buctouche for burial. Deceased formerly engaged to Buctouche and moved to Amherst several years ago. About two years ago his wife died of consumption and shortly after her death he began to show symptoms of the disease. He was 52 years of age.

—The charge preferred by William Gould of Pirog Settlement, against Mrs. Doucette and Mina Doucette, (mother and daughter,) for an assault committed by them on his wife, was heard before the Stipendiary Magistrate on Saturday last, and attracted to the Richibucto Police Court a large crowd of deeply interested auditors. The dispute, which ended in assault, arose out of a claim preferred by John H. Robichaud to the Crown land lot upon which Gould lives. Mrs. Robichaud, accompanied by her sister Mrs. Doucette, called at Gould's house in William's absence, and interviewed Mrs. Gould with reference to the alleged claim. Some strong language passed between the parties, and Mrs. Doucette and Mrs. Robichaud abruptly left the Gould domicile, each party paying the other as they parted, compliments not generally heard in polite and refined society. A few hours after the interview, Mrs. Gould having occasion to call on a neighbor's, was met on the road by Mrs. Doucette and Miss Mina, the former of whom was armed with a good stout stick, which Miss Mina asserted was carried by her mother as a walking cane, while Master Doucette who accompanied them from a neighboring lot where he had been cutting wood, carried an axe. It did not take long for the two married ladies to actively renew the hostilities of the morning and they were soon beating each other with stout sticks—a fence separating them. Mrs. Gould seized Mrs. Doucette's "cane" and wrenched it from her hands, whereupon the latter scaled the fence, and the combatants came to closer quarters. Miss Mina concluding that events called for her participation in the fray, seized the axe from her brother's hand and dealt Mrs. Gould a blow on the head, inflicting a wound from which the blood flowed. The combat therefore soon ended. Mrs. Doucette carried a black eye as a memento of the affray. The Magistrate after expressing his regret that the parties had not settled their difficulties out of Court, imposed a fine of one dollar and costs. Mr. Gould openly in Court, expressed his intense dissatisfaction at what he regarded as the inadequate punishment of the delinquents, and his determination to have the trouble further investigated and his rights more amply vindicated.

—Mrs. Alice M. Hartley, charged at Reno, Nevada, with the murder of D. Foley, formerly of Gloucester County, N. B., was found guilty of murder in the second degree.

—The Kingston youths charged with disturbing the services and breaking the windows of the Episcopal Church, Kingston, were taken before Stipendiary Magistrate Richardson, Thursday, and fined \$15 and costs. The fine was paid.

—A meeting was held at McLeod's Mills, Upper St. Louis, to take steps to organize a Company to establish a cheese factory in that locality. Another meeting will be held this week. The promoters expect to have the factory in operation next season.

—Messrs. Geo. V. McInerney, M. P., for Kent, John McAllister, M. P., for Restigouche, H. A. Powell, M. P., for Westmorland, and A. H. Hannington, Thomas Milledge and J. R. Armstrong, of St. John, have been appointed Queen's Counsel.

—If all teachers attending the Kent Co. Teachers' Institute, on the 18th and 19th of Oct., will, on their arrival in Kingston, call upon H. M. Ferguson, Esq., he will place them where they will be entertained without cost, while the Institute is in session.

—The case of Wheten vs. Starrak in the Circuit Court, concluded Wednesday. The judge left to the jury the question of the lines dividing the lots in dispute leaving them to decide upon the true line. They fixed the line claimed by Deputy Stevenson as the correct boundary, and a verdict was accordingly entered for defendant.

—Both Thomas P. Hetherington and Eva Bostwick, the principals in the St. John bigamy case, have been released on bail and there is a strong belief that they will never be called to trial. Each gives a personal security of \$500 and Mr. Thomas Hetherington is bondsman in \$500 for Hetherington and Mr. Gorham in \$500 for Miss Bostwick.

—H. T. Stevens, J. S. Boyd, and J. C. Toole, carrying on the publication of the Times newspaper, under the firm name of H. T. Stevens & Co., last week made an assignment to Capt. J. E. Masters, for the benefit of their creditors, and all proceedings in equity are stayed. There are no preferences. The personal and firm liabilities amount to between twenty and twenty-five thousand dollars. The assets, nominally, are considerably larger. The publication of the newspaper has been resumed.

—Hutchinson's mill on the Miramichi closed for the season on Saturday. Those of Sargeant, Fleet, Ritchie, and Burchill were already closed. Hickson's mill, whose logs came in late, and which also cut some two millions for William Richards, will have enough logs to keep her running till the close of the river. Mr. Richard's mill at Chatham will run a short time longer, also that of Senator Snowball. Stocks of lumber on the Miramichi will be practically all cleaned up and shipped this fall, leaving a clear field for next season's operations.—Sun.

—Quite a sensation was created in Buctouche, last week, by the news of the dismissal or suspension of a large number of the employees of the B. & M. Railway. The men discharged are Ryan and Mazerolle, brakemen, Bev. S. Smith, conductor, and station agent Smith at Notre Dame. The suspended are engine driver White and fireman Smith. Miles Wheaton, station agent at Buctouche, succeeds Smith as conductor; R. Chestnut, lately of the Moncton office, takes Wheaton's place at Buctouche and Randolph, of Fredericton, takes Mr. Chestnut's place. A man named Duncan and Alex. McKee take the places of the suspended driver and fireman and McPhadden and Bleakney take positions as brakemen. Alex. McKee has been a cleaner on the road for some time and his place is taken by his brother, W. McKee. Edward Hall, brother of the local manager at Moncton, is appointed station master at Notre Dame. These changes took effect last Monday. These changes and suspended men are in doubt as to the reasons for their dismissal and some of them have asked for an explanation. It is said that a detective employed by the managers has been in Buctouche for some time investigating matters, and that his report on the condition of affairs has resulted in the summary dismissal of the men.
