### The Preacher's Trial.

AN INTERESTING CHAT WITH THE  
REV. W. J. CHAPIN.

In the Strain of Pulpit Labor He had

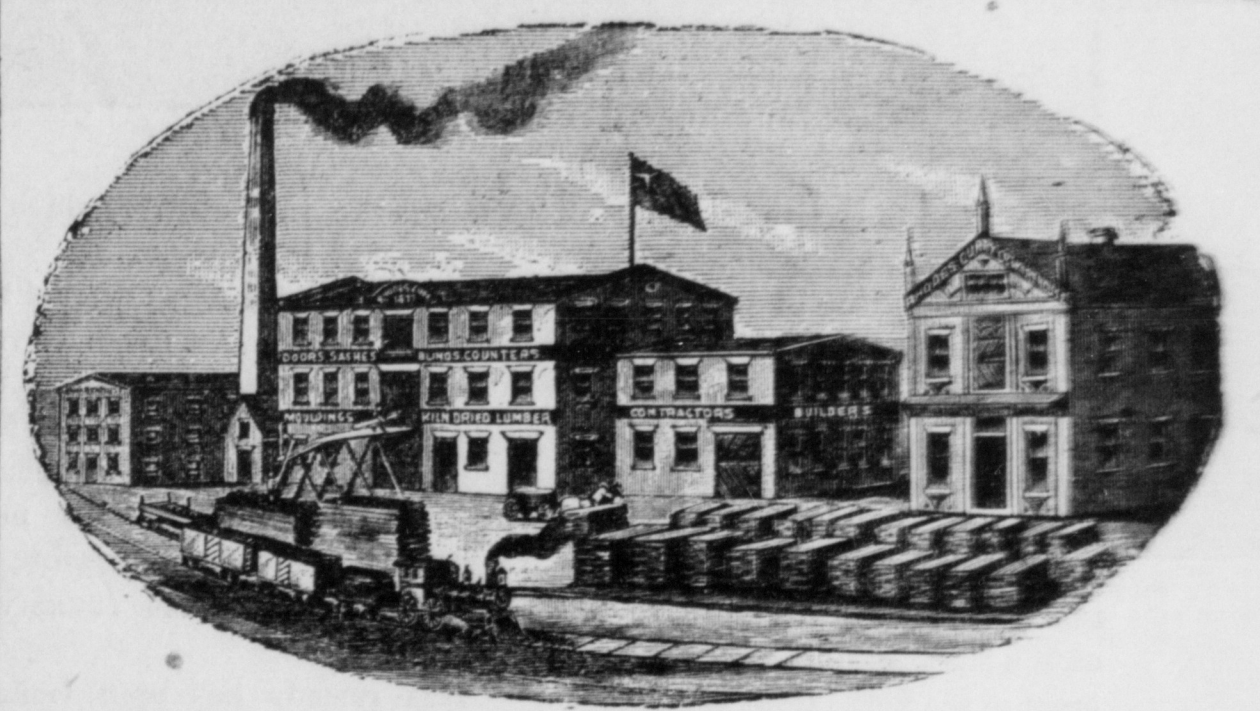
