

NUGGETS.

The Kent County Teachers' Institute opens in Kingston to-day (Thursday). Messrs. James F. Burns and Edward Dobson, of South Branch, were in town Tuesday. The Kingston Agricultural Society held its annual exhibition in Kingston, Wednesday. The prize list is published this week. Notwithstanding the unfavorable weather there was a good attendance, and the exhibits were above the average. Messrs. Lefleur, Roi, Fusey, and Benasconi, Dominion Government engineers, who have been for the past two months surveying the harbour with a view to improving the channel at the entrance, finished their labor and left last week. It is not known what conclusion they have arrived at. At St. Paul, last Monday the case of John H. Reid vs. James Wiley, was tried before Justice Joseph Bernard. The action was for debt for goods and work. The defendant claimed a set off and appeared by Mr. H. M. Ferguson, of Kingston. Plaintiff conducted his case in person. Several witnesses were examined and at the close of the proceedings the justice in a clear and concise judgment gave his decision in favor of defendant. The annual school meeting of district No. 1, Richibucto, was held in the Grammar School building, Thursday. A large number of the ratepayers of the district were in attendance. The financial report was a very encouraging one there being a balance of seven hundred dollars on hand, an increase of four hundred dollars over that of last year. The outlay for school purposes during the year was about \$1200. The meeting voted an assessment of twelve hundred dollars and decided to devote part of that amount to the payment of school debentures. It was decided to paint and repair the school building next spring. The retiring trustee Wm. D. Carter, having declined re-election, Mr. Allen Hains was elected in his place. Mr. Daniel O'Leary a respected citizen and a brother of Mr. Henry O'Leary, died of paralysis, Saturday, aged seventy seven years. He was ill only a few hours, having been around all Friday in good health. Mr. O'Leary came to Kent County from Ireland fifty-seven years ago. He held responsible positions with both Cunard and Caie in the old days when they were extensively engaged in lumbering. For nearly twenty years he was connected with the business of Henry O'Leary from which he retired within two years. He also served for some time at the council board. Deceased leaves a wife, five sons and one daughter. His remains were interred in the Roman Catholic burying ground, Richibucto, Monday. Rev. D. V. Gwilym, formerly rector of St. Mary's Episcopal Church, Richibucto, and well known to many of our readers in Kent County, united with Calvary Baptist Church, Brooklyn, New York, last Friday where he related his experience and views of Bible truth. After Mr. Gwilym left Richibucto he had charge of a parish in the State of Maine for some time, and subsequently removed to Brooklyn, where he has been for some years rector of St. David's Church, which belongs to the high church element of the Episcopal denomination. Mr. Gwilym was, it is said, regarded by Bishop Littlejohn as a talented man, and one of the most eloquent speakers in his diocese. It is said he was converted to the Baptist faith at Ocean Grove last summer. He is at present in charge of the Utica Avenue tabernacle, and it is expected will soon come before a council of Baptist ministers in Brooklyn for ordination as a clergyman of that denomination. About six months ago mention was made of a large estate left in Spain by one Joseph de Grace, a brother of Count de Grace who took such a prominent part in the siege of Yorktown, whereby the American people gained their independence. It now seems that the rumors then set afloat were not without some foundation, for one of the heirs hailing from Bathurst, N. B., but now of Duluth, Minn., John de Grace, has just embarked for Spain armed with the necessary proofs to show that the large fortune in question really belongs to the heirs of Antoine de Grace, who came from Spain when a young man and settled down and died in Bathurst. This same John de Grace has been quietly working up the case for some years and it would now seem as though his efforts and those of his counsel were to be crowned with success. The estate is a large one, valued at several millions of dollars. The greater number of the heirs reside in Gloucester county, several in Kent county, and it is to be hoped that their most sanguine expectations will be realized.

The award as signed by Messrs. Holt, of St. Stephen, and Surtees of Ottawa is for the sum of \$343,000. It is said that Mr. Walter Shanley the arbitrator for the company was in favor of a much larger sum. The costs will amount to \$10,000. The remains of the late Mrs. Sylvain Richard, widow of the late Sylvain S. Richard, Pilot of Richibucto Cape, were brought to Kingston from Lynn, Mass., where she died, on Monday last and interred on Tuesday in the Richibucto Village cemetery. Jacques and Alexander Richard, sons of the deceased, accompanied the body. Mrs. Richard leaves five sons and one daughter, Mrs. Joseph Leveque of Salem, surviving her. Mr. W. S. Loggie has settled with his creditors for 40 cents on the dollar, cash, and put his business into the hands of a limited liability company—The W. S. Loggie Co. Limited—with a capital of \$150,000. He will be the manager. Mr. Loggie is an energetic and enterprising man of business, but has been hampered by some losses and by lack of sufficient capital for his extensive operations. Everybody wishes the new company prosperity.—World. At Moncton last week Sheriff McQueen sold under the executions of O. Jones and Merchants' Bank of Halifax, the interests of H. T. Stevens in the plant and machinery in The Times office. The property was sold to Mr. H. A. Powell for \$25, subject to the incumbrances. Notice was given at the sale by Mr. W. B. Chandler on behalf of J. E. Masters, assignee of Messrs. Stevens, Boyd & Toole, that the machinery and plant in the office were partnership property and that Mr. Stevens had no beneficial interests in such property. The total incumbrances against the plant were about \$10,000. Mr. Masters is still issuing the paper as assignee. The Miramichi Yacht Club sailed a lively race Thursday afternoon between the lower end of Chatham and Douglas-town, twice around, a distance of ten or twelve miles. Oriana won the race, beating the Leargig on corrected time and the Maude (same measurement) on elapsed time, but was ruled out on a technicality and the first prize, \$35, given to the Maude and the second, \$15, to the Leargig. The wind was strong and puffy and half the race was windward work against the current. The time was inside of two hours. The Oriana gained a minute on the Leargig and passed her on the first round, but the Leargig got the lead on the second round. It was a close and exciting race and there was a grand fusillade of steam whistles at the finish.
