—Mr. Geo. K. McLeod was in town, last week.

—Messrs. David Miller and Joseph Miller of Molus River, were in town, Friday.
—Inspector Smith is visiting the school of Botsford, Westmorland County, this month, and will be in Kent County during October.
—The Courier reports the death from hiccoughs of Henry Christie, who lived about four miles from Bathurst. While in good health he was attacked by hiccoughs, and in three days, despite medical aid, he was dead.
—A London despatch says: The steamer Maryla, which arrived today from Baltimore, had on board the crew of the British barque Capenhurst, Capt. Jones, which sailed from Newcastle, N. B., August 26, for Liverpool. The Capenhurst was abandoned at sea. She carried a crew of twelve men.
—The Fredericton Gleaner says: Mrs. Peake, of College Road, has sold her house to Mr. G. H. Miner, formerly of Richibucto. The price paid is said to be a good one for the property. Mrs. Peake will move tomorrow, and Mr. Miner takes possession almost immediately. He intends to keep boarders and already has several applications from college students.
—In another column will be found an open letter from a prominent physician relating the facts of a cure of consumption after the patient had reached the last stages of this hitherto unconquered disease. The statements made are really remarkable, and mark another advance in the progress of medical science. Our readers will find the article well worth a careful perusal.
—Mrs. Catherine A. Robbins (formerly Mrs. Kent-Mason), the notorious confidence woman who swindled Yale graduates, pleaded guilty at Hartford, Ct., to each of four counts charging her with obtaining money under false pretences, and was sentenced to two years in jail. Some years ago Mrs. Kent-Mason visited Richibucto and other New Brunswick towns lecturing on temperance. She also preached in the churches here and in other places.
—A Montreal despatch says:—W. S. Loggie, of Chatham, is here for the purpose of arranging a compromise with a number of local firms. The total amount of his liabilities, including indirect liabilities, is about \$150,000. A number of Montreal firms have already agreed to a compromise of forty cents, cash, on the dollar, and it is expected others will fall into line. The Bank of Montreal is a creditor. All the creditors in Toronto have agreed to a settlement.
—The ninth annual Convention of the Kent Co. S. S. Association will be held in Zion Church, West Branch, on Wednesday and Thursday, 26th and 27th Sept. Each school is entitled to send three delegates, superintendent and two teachers. The following subjects will be discussed: "Obligations from scripture to teach the children," "The character and qualifications of the teacher," "Methods of teaching and mode of dealing with the children," "What class of books should compose a S. S. Library."
—The trouble between the proprietors of the Moncton Times has culminated in the courts being called upon to intervene. Mr. R. Barry Smith, of Moncton, last week obtained an injunction from Judge Barker at the instance of Henry T. Stevel of the Times, against J. S. Boyd and T. D. Toole enjoining them to discontinue any interference with the publication of the Times or business connected therewith, collection of accounts, etc., and praying for a dissolution of partnership.
—Before the Circuit Court at Bathurst last week, Joseph C. Cormier, of Buctouche, charged with embezzling the funds of The Singer Manufacturing Company was acquitted. Judge Tuck in addressing the jury expressed himself in very strong terms concerning the conduct of the Company in using or rather abusing the process of the criminal law in trying to collect a civil debt. "It is time," said he "to put a stop to these tactics employed by this and other Companies of taking advantage of the Criminal Courts for the collection of their debts."
—Last week several of the old students of St. Joseph's College, Memramcook, met there to form an Alumni Association. Among those present were Judge Landry, of Dorchester, Geo. V. McInerney, M. P., Richibucto, Judge Ritchie, Dr. J. P. McInerney, and Dr. Travers, of St. John, Dr. Bellevue, O. M. Melanson, and Ferd Robideaux, of Shediac, John R. Cosigan, Barrister of Calgary, N. W. T., and several others. An address presented by the students was responded to by Judge Landry, Geo. V. McInerney, M. P., and Drs. Travers, Bellevue, Gaudet, and Doherty. The meeting was adjourned till Oct. 10th.

—Messrs. B. S. Bailey, Thomas Atkinson, William Delaney, Robert Atkinson, David Delahunty, Andrew Fraser, Andrew Dale, and George Guitart, of Harcourt, were in town Friday attending Stipendiary Richardson's court.
—Scientists are now telling us that the dangerous microbe is lurking in the green-back. Those in arrears for subscription to THE REVIEW can send the money, as the publisher has facilities to disinfect small amounts, and is willing to take the risk.
—Hon. James Mitchell, Provincial Secretary, was in Richibucto last Thursday inspecting the County Record Office. The building does not meet the requirements of the act of last session, and it is probable that the municipality will be called upon to erect a new building.
—The Kent Circuit Court will open here next Tuesday, Judge Landry presiding. There is so far as known no criminal business. There will be at least five civil causes for trial. The Act of last session makes it competent to try all civil causes without the aid of a jury except when specially applied for. The lawyers appear to favor the old practice, for a jury has been asked for in every case.
—The arguments in the Moncton water and light works expropriation ended Saturday. The arbitrators have had the estimates of experts and will no doubt be able to arrive at a conclusion. Willis Chipman, the expert brought from Toronto valued the property at \$193,943, which is his estimate of what it would cost to replace the works as they stand to-day. The company's expert placed the commercial value at \$505,000.
—An interesting event occurred at St. Paul's church, Sackville, on Wednesday, Sept 12th, when Mr. James Fraser, of Fredericton led to the altar Miss Clara Norris. The happy couple were made one by the Rev. Cecil Higgins. Mr. Fraser and his bride arrived in St. John Friday last and registered at the Victoria hotel. They are spending their bridal tour in a most novel way. Driving from Sackville to St. John by road with a span of horses. They will remain there for a few days after which they will journey through Nova Scotia and returning will reside in Fredericton. The entire trip will be by driving.
—The Fredericton correspondent of the St. John Globe says:—Mr. Alex. Gibson has apparently not lost confidence in the lumber trade. During the present season he has not only kept his capacious saw mills at Marysville and Blackville constantly running, but he has had Messrs. Hale & Murchie's Mill and Mr. Donald Fraser's new mill in this city employed for the past couple of months sawing lumber for him as well. Next season he proposes to build a new mill at Blackville as large as the one in operation and will no doubt keep it constantly running along with the others. He is at present negotiating and has about closed with McFarlane, Thompson & Anderson of this city for the manufacture of the necessary machinery.
—The disappearance of George Stevenson has given rise to a sensation in Molus River. Stevenson was to have been married last week to Miss Dargavel, of that place, and every preparation was made for the wedding. The minister and guests were in attendance, but at the hour named for the ceremony the intended bridegroom failed to put in an appearance. On inquiry it was learned that he had made every preparation for his marriage and had set out a short time before the appointed hour, for the home of the young lady where the ceremony was to be performed. When he could have gone is a mystery. It is thought he has cleared out to the States. The minister invited to witness the ceremony, managed to spend a pleasant evening notwithstanding their disappointment.
