THE PRIMROSE DISASTER.—The bodies of all those drowned in the late yachting accident in St. John Harbor, have been recovered.

NEW METHODIST CHURCH.—The new Methodist Church at Shediac was dedicated last Sunday. Rev. W. W. Brener preached the dedicatory sermon.

CANADIAN CODEFISH.—Are now admitted free of duty to the Spanish West Indies, and the Spanish Government has so advised the Governor of Cuba.

LABOR DAY.—The bank clerks, school teachers, lawyers and other hard worked individuals in Richibucto, enjoyed the statutory holiday on Monday, by a relaxation from their hard labors, while the millmen, ship laborers and mechanics continued their usual avocations.

A FINE IMPOSED.—At the hearing of the complaint against J. E. Thompson of the Queen Hotel last Wednesday, for selling without license, Constable Richard gave evidence of the sale and the Stipendiary Magistrate imposed a fine of \$50 and costs. Thompson was undefended but it is said will appeal.

J. D. Phinney, M. P. P., went to Chatham, Wednesday.

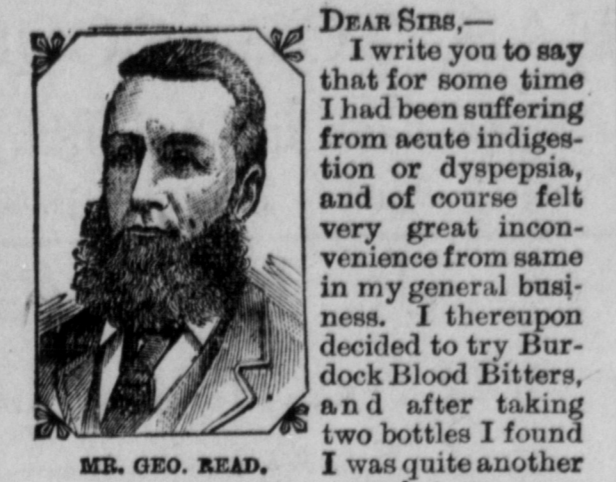
Henry O'Leary, Fred Richard, Frank Richard and Napoleon Legere left for St. Joseph's College, Memramcook, Tuesday.

NUGGETS.

General Herbert will not be recalled to England but will continue to fill the position now held by him as Commander-in-chief of the Canadian militia.

The Dominion Government has decided to deepen the Lochine canal to a uniform depth of fifteen feet. The estimated cost is \$50,000. Tenders are called for.

Our readers will be pleased to read the interesting yachting notes from the Clyde in this issue of THE REVIEW. We trust our correspondent will favor us with further communications from Auld Scotia's "Smoky City."

An Ottawa despatch says:—Hon. Mr. Patterson, minister of militia, leaves for the maritime provinces in a few days on official business. He will visit the camp at Levis, and then proceed to Nova Scotia and New Brunswick to inspect the different military properties owned by the Dominion.

Before Judge Hannington at chambers Moncton, last week, on application of R. W. Hewson, in the case of Emma C. Sherwood et al plaintiffs, against Budd et al, defendants an injunction was granted restraining defendants from disposing of plaintiffs' land. The parties belong to Coatesville, Kent Co.

The latest political rumor from Ottawa is that Parliament will meet early in December and that the general election will come off in March next. We would not be at all surprised to learn that the rumor is well-founded. Aspirants for seats at Ottawa, can have their cards printed at THE REVIEW office at reasonable rates.

The election to fill the vacancy in Carleton County, caused by the resignation of Mr. Cornell last February, has not yet been brought on. Mr. Blair has evidently concluded that he can represent the county without the advice of the electors, and can do it more easily since Mr. Connell is not in the government to watch him and make it hot for him.

According to Sir John Lubbock one-third of the national income of Great Britain is taken to pay charges imposed by past wars; another third is swallowed up in preparing for further conflicts, and the balance is all that is left to meet the ordinary expenses of government and provide useful public works. In the light of these facts there are few who will disagree with the declaration of a former Earl of Derby that the greatest of Britain's interests is peace.

Speaking of the acquittal of the alleged firebugs at Newcastle, the Union Advocate last week used the following strong language: Some persons when leaving the court house after the prisoner had been discharged expressed the view that it was a pity our people were so law abiding, as a touch of Lynch law would have a salutary effect, and it would have been done in some places on this continent: the prisoners would have been strung up to the cross bar of a telegraph post, and a few of the jury strung up with them to keep them company.

Clarke Wallace, the comptroller of Customs was given a grand Orange reception at Windsor Hall, Montreal, on Wednesday last week on his return from London where he attended the Triennial Orange Council. An address was presented to him in which the following reference was made to the position occupied by Mr. Wallace and Mr. Bowell as members of a government led by a Catholic Premier:

We believe that the Orange Association is broad enough to rejoice in the fact that a Roman Catholic Premier was justified in inviting the highest official in the ranks of Orangeism in the world to become a member of his Government, and that so far from being afraid of each other they work together over state matters in the utmost confidence, neither having to apologize to the other for his religious or social convictions. We have no reluctance in giving our fullest endorsement to such a condition of affairs. You are a prominent illustration of the principles of the Orange Association which, while maintaining independence of thought and respectful freedom of speech, concedes to those who differ from us all the liberties to which we lay claim. We recognize that your "liberal heart has devised liberal things," and that you discountenance that narrowness of mind that seeks publicity in making threats and unseemly agitation. The Orange Association was born in troublous times and in the throes of war. A life of more than two centuries has brought about the day when a calm expression of what we believe to be our inalienable rights will secure in the majority of cases righteous advocacy from every quarter, far before the fanatical clamor of battle. An association that has prospered for two hundred years and is to-day stronger than ever, must have many noble and commendable qualities. It does not thrive on bluster, nor strengthen its life by menace. Those who favor that coarse fare, can find it outside the order we represent, in organizations that are born only to meet a hasty death. We are glad that you have emphasized the fact that Orangeism is not an enemy to any man or body of men, but is the conservator of, and pleader for the freedom of human conscience and civil liberty and equality. While these tenets remain in our historic creed the association shall live and prosper.

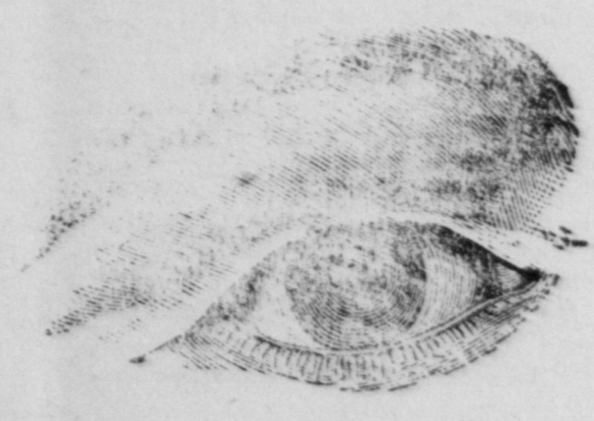
