bucto about fifteen years ago as a tem-  
perance lecturer and enjoyed quite a  
reputation in that respect, has been ar-  
rested and is now in gaol at Hartford, Con-  
necticut.

—The contract for the completion of  
the "Kingston Opera House" has been  
let to Mr. James Brown, of Harcourt.  
The figure for the whole, including Mr.  
Brown's former contract and the present  
one is in the vicinity of \$2335.

—Messrs. Kerr & Robertson, hardware  
dealers of St. John, whose new advertise-  
ment appears in this issue of THE RE-  
VIEW, have given to the new "Opera  
House," Kingston, a knob and lock for the  
door and 100 lbs. of best white lead.

—Messrs. Stewart who are erecting the  
new lazaretto at Tracadie, are making  
rapid progress with the work. The walls  
are already fifteen feet above the ground.  
The contract calls for the completion of  
the building in 1896, but the contractors  
expect to have it completed and ready for  
occupation next fall.

—The blueberry trade is quite brisk at  
Tracadie. There are four canning  
establishments in operation. Messrs. A.

& R. Logie and Wm. S. Logie at the  
Big Tracadie bridge and Messrs. J. & R.  
Young and an American firm at the  
village. It is expected that fully two  
hundred tons of blueberries will be canned  
there this season.

—The Cushing and Hilyard mills of St.  
John, have recently had a contest in saw-  
ing, using gang saws and cutting spruce  
logs. On the four hours test the Cushing  
mill turned out 37,000 feet of lumber in  
the given time with one gang of saws.  
The cut of the Hilyard mill was 44,573  
feet or 11,144½ feet per hour, which as the  
Cushing says is really wonderful work.

—The publishers of the Moncton Times,  
we regret to learn, are quarrelling amongst  
themselves. Mr. Stevens has given notice  
that no person is authorized to sign the  
firm's name (H. T. Stevens & Co.)—and  
Messrs. Boyd and Toole, the other mem-  
bers of the firm have forbidden all parties  
paying or discounting any note, bill or  
cheque payable to, made, drawn or bear-  
ing the indorsement of the said firm.

—Here is a warning to persons who per-  
sistently neglect to pay their subscriptions  
to the newspapers. Recently a newspaper  
brought suit against forty-three men who  
would not pay their subscriptions, and  
obtained judgment in each case for the  
amount of each claim. Of these, twenty-  
eight made affidavit that they owned no  
more than the law allowed them, thus  
preventing attachments. Then under the  
decision of the supreme court, they were  
arrested for petit larceny and bound over  
in the sum of \$300 each. All but six gave  
the bonds. The postal laws make it petit  
larceny to take a paper and refuse to pay  
for it.—Exchange.

—His Lordship Bishop Sweeney of St.  
John—whose Diocese includes the south-  
ern portion of Kent County as far north  
as Chockpish—on Saturday last celebrated  
the 50th anniversary of his ordination to  
the priesthood. He has been a Bishop for  
thirty years. All the newspapers of the  
city write in the highest terms of the  
worthy prelate, and give interesting  
sketches of his career. The Gazette says:  
It has fallen to the lot of but few men to  
do so much in such a comparatively short  
time. But the bishop of St. John has  
been an industrious man possessed of a  
larger degree of ability than is awarded to  
the majority of people. The harmony  
that has prevailed amongst his own and  
other denominations is due largely to the  
tolerance of the bishop who, under most  
trying circumstances, has maintained his  
temper and taught not only his own flock  
but others outside the pale of his com-  
munion, that patience and toleration are  
after all the best of policies. Everyone  
will congratulate the venerable bishop in  
having passed his golden jubilee and wish  
him many more years of usefulness.

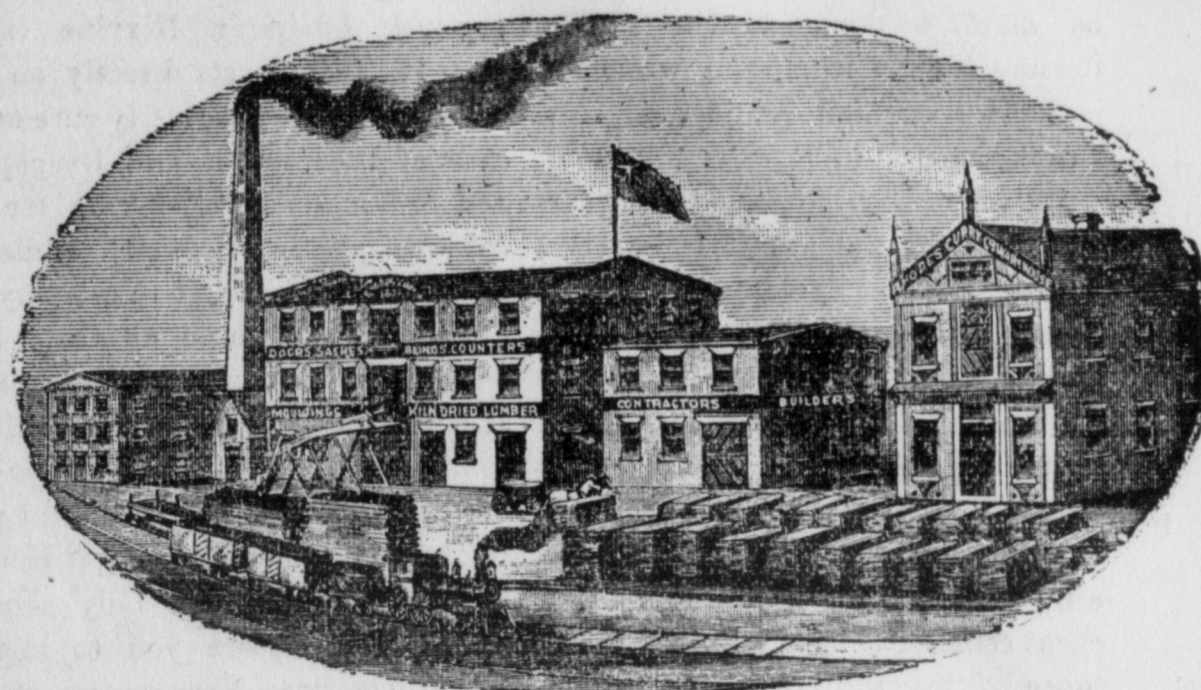
