THE NEW CZAR.—The New Czar Nicholas is described by a European correspondent as a weak man, who falls readily under the influence of the strongest minds that are nearest to him. Yet it is said that his English and Danish cousins have imbued him with liberal opinions, and that he has always been opposed to the Czar Alexander the Third's despotic domestic policy. The correspondent spins a yarn about the late Czar having flogged his son, the present Czar, for remonstrating against his persecution of the Jews and Christian sects other than those of the orthodox church of Russia. The strongest influence nearest to the Czarowitch was surely that of his father, the Czar, yet it seems to have had the effect of driving him into agreement with more liberal-minded relatives who were far off, and who can have had few opportunities of bringing it to bear upon him. A despatch to the St. John Telegraph from Toronto, under date Saturday, Nov. 10th, says: The famous trotting stallion Harry Wilkes, which not long ago cost New Brunswick government over \$20,000, and subsequently passed into other hands, was sold at auction here to-day to Detroit buyers for the ridiculous low figure of \$950. It is understood the sale was for debt.

The export from Montreal this year from the beginning of navigation down to the end of October was 5,095.

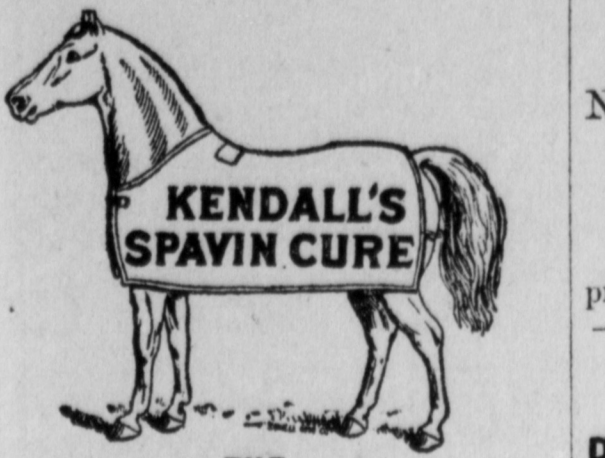
In charging a jury at Pittsburg, Friday, Judge White said: "The general idea of drunkenness is expressed in the following lines:
