Refused The Money.

The following odd incident is related
of Conductor McKinney, who was em-
ployed many years ago upon a southern
railway:

One night in leaving Washington the
conductor went as usual through the train
to collect the fares. In one of the rear
cars a passenger without a ticket handed
him a bill. The conductor took it, glanced
at it hastily and, seeing that it was of a
large denomination, put it into his pocket,
as conductors are apt to do, and informed
the passenger that he would return with
the change.

The purpose of the delay was, of course,
to afford the conductor an opportunity to
examine the bill at his leisure in the bag-
gage car to see if it was all right. When
Mr. McKinney reached the baggage car
and inspected the note he found to his
astonishment that what he had taken for
a \$100 bill was a note for \$1,000.

Of course the changing of a bill of such
a denomination was out of the question.
The conductor therefore passed back
through the train to refund the money and
obtain a smaller bill. When he reached
the car the passenger had shifted his seat.
Going up to him, the conductor said that
there was probably a mistake, as the bill
given by him was for \$1,000.

To his utter amazement the passenger
disclaimed all knowledge of the bill. He
had given a ticket, he said, and his seat-
mate confirmed the statement. The con-
ductor expostulated, but the man was firm
and could not be prevailed upon to accept
the money.

Finally the conductor gave up in despair
not knowing whether he or the passenger
was crazy, but inclined to the latter belief.
At a station two from Washington the
passenger and his companion left the train
and hastily disappeared. The next day
Mr. McKinney handed in the bill to the
company's office with an explanation.

The money was deposited on a special
account and the railroad officials awaited
the coming of a claimant. Year after year
passed, however, and no one ever turned
up for the money, which in the meanwhile
was steadily adding interest. Finally
when Mr. McKinney retired from the
service of the company the officials gave
him the proceeds of the bill, which at
interest then amounted to nearly \$2,000.

No explanation was ever vouchsafed of
the odd occurrence. The theory gener-
ally credited by the conductor and the rail-
way officials, however, was that the bill
was given by mistake by some burglar,
who upon discovering his error decided
that it was safer to repudiate the transac-
tion than to acknowledge the ownership of
the money, the large amount of which he
thought might render the conductor suspi-
cious and lead to his arrest.—New York
Herald.

The Chinese Names of the Treaty Powers.

The Chinese, when they first knew their
Eastern neighbors who are now exhibiting
such a restless war spirit, named them Wa
people. In their histories this single word
was sufficient. By change of vowel during
two thousand years Wa has become Wo.
In the imperial declaration of war of
August 1 this is the term used, and it is
brief and sufficient. The Chinese like
monosyllable names for countries. The
various foreign nations have, when making
treaties, usually chosen the monosyllables
which form their names. England, Ying
Kwo, means "the flourishing country,"
for Ying, the treaty character for Great
Britain, has that sense. Fa means law,
and France, Fa kwo, is the "law abiding
country." Germany, known as Te kwo,
is the "virtuous country." The United
States republic is the Mei kwo, or
"beautiful country." Italy is the "country
of justice," I kwo. Each treaty nation
has chosen its own name for moral effect.
It has been a matter for international
diplomacy, and the Chinese government
had invariably given way to the wishes of
each of the treaty powers as represented
by its minister and his Chinese secretary.
From the time that the ministers of the
treaty nations had residence in Peking the
name of the country made use of in
diplomatic correspondence has been, of
course, that which was satisfactory to the
treaty powers. The same was the case
with Japan. Japan, there can be no
doubt, prefers Ji pen, the Land of the Ris-
ing Sun, because it is more poetical than
the name Wo, which means "submissive,"
"winding and twisting." On the whole
Japan wishes to be known as the land of
the sun, Ji kwo, but she also likes Ji pen,
which is the same as Japan, and she has
not made the use of the term Wo a matter
of complaint.—North China Herald.
