

To-day I had the pleasure of visiting the largest and finest yacht ever built in America, a description of which might please some of your readers. The forecastle is 34 feet long, a large steam launch and a naptha launch. divided into two sections, the forward part for the petty officers and each provided with a lavatory and toilet room, the finish is in white and there are 32 berths finished in paneled buternut. Aft of the forecastle is the officers mess room, 18 feet in length, finished in white pine done in tints There is an oak dining table 12 ft. long, with chairs, while at the end is handsomely upholstered transom couch. Off the officers mess room is a well arranged pantry, also a bath room with set tubs and bowls. Then comes the sleeping appartments for the officers, seven in number and finished in butternut wood. Three of these rooms are single-those for the chief engineer, Norwich, Conn. Mr. John Slater and first mate and steward, the junior officers and the assistant engineers being placed two in a room. Upon the main deck, well forward, is the kitchen, a thoroughly London from where she will soon leave equipped apartment the floor red tiles and the walls half way to the ceiling in white tile, the finish being butternut wood. Here is a large Duvarguet range, cold storage, shelves, drawers and lockers. All the cooking utensils are of solid nickle silver. Adjoining is the scullery, with sinks and all the facilities for washing dishes. Here comes the firemen's room with conveniences for washing a toilet room adjoining it. The steam laundry finely equipped with every appliance with a large drying room comes next, and then comes the engine room. Proceeding aft one comes to the owner's pantry, equipped with dressers, ice chest, dish racks and cup hooks, finished in red mahogany, and then comes the owners dining room, finished in elaborately paneled quartered oak, having a finely carved sideboard. Abaft the dining room is the social hall or smoking zoom finished in quartered oak and having a Aceplace in Venetian tile with a large hearth stone in black marble. Over the fire place is a richly carved mantle with figures of youth bearing flowers, the cornice being carved dolphins. Along the sides of this room are couches richly upholstered. Here are wardrobes for receiving wraps, etc. From the hall a highly polished stairway of carved oak leads to the beeth deck and to the main saloon, which is very richly finished in polished mahogany exquisitely carved. Upon the swinging panels will be hung four paintings valued at \$60,000. The large skylight and dead light give the apartment ample light in the day time, while at night it will be illuminated bp a large cut glass hanging lamp. At the foreward end of this apartment is a handsome fireplace of hand decorated tiles with a superbly carved mantlepiece, in the centre of which is a \$600,00. Upon the right side of this fireplace is a roll top desk, upon the left is a fine piano. In the centre of the room is an elegant mahogany table while along the sides are elegantly upholstered divans. Forward of this saloon on the starboard side is the owner's study, with much looker room, book cases, lounge, table, deak and dressing table, elegant in design and in rich finish. In this room are electric buttons and speaking tubes extending to all parts of the ship. A large safe is set in the wall. Adjoining as Mrs. Stater's

The walls are hung with tapestry, the doors are heavy French plate mirrors, the the finish of the room is hand carved and it is furnished with an extra large four fluted pilastered bed, couch, desk, bureau, dressing table, ann lockers. Next to it is the nursery with accomodation for three, the lavatory being of Sienna marble. Then comes the pantry and silver room, finished in red mahogany and cedar. On the opposite side of the ship is a suite of 3 rooms all elegantly furnished. Opposite the owner's nursery is the guests nursery. Aft the main saloon are two state rooms, the lavatory in one being of rose Jasper, the other being of Italian marble. Then comes another bath room, aft of which comes the maids' quarters. Between the owner's dining room on the main deck and the sailing masters' room is an inside passage, permitting the owner to pass to any part of the ship without being exposed to the weather. Off this passage is the chart room-containing 850 charts. The captains quarters are in the forward part of the house and about the pleasentest on the ship. His dining room is 12 x 16 feet, finished in white mahogany, with highly polished table and chairs, a richly upholstered divan is built against the transom. Opening from it is the captain's state room, finished in mahogany, with desk, dressingtable and divan. Below are two more state rooms for guests. There are seven bath rooms on this ship each supplied with

hot and cold, salt and fresh water, all the

state rooms have hot and cold water. Large fan blowers exhaust the vitiated air from every room and every part of this ship, giving perfect ventilation. The vessel is heated by steam with nickle plated radiators. Two electric out re-coaling. The vessel carries two life boats, a gig sail boat and dingy besides Her crew numbers 44 including 2 Chinese laundrymen, and with guests and all, she will accommodate 67 people. Ready for cruise she will represent about half a million dollars and is pronounced by experienced vachtmen to be the finest of her kind. She was modelled and designed throughout by Charles Ridgeley Hamscons superentendent of the Bath Iron Works, and built under his eye, and he has received the higest congratulations for his skill as shown in great work. She will be commanded by Captain C. W. Scott, a veteran yachtman who has cruised in every sea, aid is owned by William A. 




