## GENERAL NEWS.

Sir John Thompson is in Paris, where he will remain until the end of the month.

Seventeen Chicago policemen have been suspended for indifference during the election riots.

It is reported that 100 people have been killed by earthquakes along the northern coast of Chili.

Owing to lack of money about 500 officers of the police department of Chicago are to be discharged.

The advance guard of negro emigrants for Liberia, Africa, has started from Birmingham, Alabama.

George W. Boggs, ex-city treasurer of Tacoma, Wash., has been arrested, charged with embezzling \$24,386.

The athletic council of Cornell University has decided to send a crew to compete in the Henley regatta in London next June.

Mrs. Robert Marshall of Calgary, fell dead last Tuesday while assisting an undertaker to robe the body of her child for burial.

The volcano of Colima, in Mexico, is again in active eruption, and people in the immediate vicinity have abandoned their homes.

The Kanaka tribe is reported to have murdered all the European settlers on the islands near New Guinea, and indulged in a cannibal feast.

A lion is at large near Washington court house, Ohio, and the people are in a state of fright. The beast is supposed to have escaped from a circus.

The New York Committee of Seventy have resolved upon permanent organization, and their object will be to assist the city officers in securing good government.

The Kurds are reported to have massacred 3,000 Armenians, including women and children, in Turkish Armenia, and destroyed 25 villages. The Turkish officials deny the report.

The mail carrier between Kingston, Ont. postoffice and the Grand Trunk Railway junction has been furnished with a sword and a revolver. This is a precaution taken since the recent robbery.

The officials of the Chinese government have made the apologies demanded by the British government officials for the outrage committed by Chinese soldiers on board the British steamship, Chung King, in August last.

Eight years ago the husband of Widow Enright, living in Toronto, was killed by being crushed by two freight cars in the Grand Trunk yards. On Saturday she was deprived of her boy William in a

similar manner. He was only 10 years of age.

Governor Flower expresses a willingness to allow experts to make a test to ascertain whether a man killed in the electric chair can be resuscitated. The Westinghouse people declare that men electrocuted were not killed in the chair, but that the subsequent autopsy made death sure.

The result of the clean up on the Horse fly hydraulic claim at Cariboo has been received. The cuts have been frozen in so that the heaviest portion of the claim is unapproachable but the sluice boxes yielded \$13,000 worth of gold, the result of a half month's work. It is claimed that the mine will yield \$40,000 worth of gold a month.

The British ship Culmure, Capt. Read, foundered eighty miles off Spurn head, county of York, England, Wednesday, 22 persons were drowned. The Culmure was built at Port Glasgow in 1890. She registered 1,629 tons and was 260 feet long, 33 feet beam and 23 feet deep. She sailed from Londonderry and was owned by Thompson, Dickie & Company.

The New York Times says: "The Canadians have shown great enterprise since the opening of the Canadian Pacific in diverting trade to that route, while the Californians seem to have been very apathetic. The laying of a cable from Vancouver instead of from San Francisco will give the Canadians a very marked advantage in their effort to capture the Pacific trade."

The three murders by strangulation of the demi monde that have taken place in Denver, Col., have not only caused the wildest excitement among the denizens of Market street, but set all classes speculating as to the identity of the strangler. Medical men are inclined to look upon the murders as the work of some one with uncontrollable homicidal tendencies developed only upon certain occasions. Coroner Martin says a Denver business man is under strong suspicion of being affected and of being the murderer. All of the Japanese arrested on suspicion, have been released.
