He has a special reputation as a discoverer of rare plants, and on a recent visit to Restigouche, discovered a plant "collusaria gracilis," on Eel River Bar below Dalhousie which has not been found in any other locality east of the Rocky mountains. —The Chatham World has the following comment on the Blair-Wilson-Quinn corruption business:—Most of the organs of the Local Government have been supplied with supplements containing the report of the committee Mr. Blair appointed for the purpose of relieving him of the odium resulting from the exposure of the office-selling business carried on by his partner and political associates. The inquiry, as far as it went, showed that Mr. Blair personally kept aloof from the brokerage business and failed sometimes to deliver the goods which his associates had sold. The supplement is amusingly headed, 'Official Report of the Stockton-Phinney-Pitts Conspiracy against the Attorney General in the Quinn Matter.' It is, no doubt, printed at the expense of the province. The report may be considered of great service as a campaign document, but it does not alter the bald fact that Mr. Blair's business partner and political partner sold Mr. Quinn an office. They got the money for it, and gave a receipt for the same. The make in the Old Country has been unusually large, and Cheshire cheese, so private advisers say, is lower than for some years. Stocks here are exceptionally heavy. —Woodall's, London, report (an authority) on the prospect of the Canadian apple trade in Great Britain for this year is unusually brilliant. It is said that the prospects for the trade are even better than in the bonanza years of 1891 and 1892. The report further states that there is scarcely any fruit worthy of attention in the British Isles or on the continent, and that the importations of apples must necessarily be heavy. —A boat race in connection with the picnic in Kingston, on Thursday the 23rd instant, is being looked forward to by boatmen. The course is from Brait's wharf down the river to Marsh Point Buoy and back to the starting point. The course of the rowing race will be above Kingston Bridge. Race to be two miles.
