wheels were the motion of the vessel was such less. The rain had ceased falling, but the fog began to get more dense. We steamed on down past Indian Island, saw the Wolves in the distance on the one hand, and Deer Island on the other. We passed Head Harbor Light on the northern extremity of Campobello, and soon lay at the company's wharf at Eastport. I left my companions here to continue on their journey to Boston in company with a friend, his wife and child. The Cumberland had to go back around Head Harbor as the tide was low and the passage between the Lubec shore and Campobello is only navigable when the tide is fairly high. At low water this passage is full of dangerous whirl pools and the sea is so choppy that it is spoken of as the Rips. That afternoon, I visited the sardine factories and I think no man could have catarrh so bad but what the smell of these factories would be at least repugnant to him. I then went across to Welchpool on Campobello and drove up to Wilson's Beach and around the island, visited a friend at the Owens Hotel. This with two other large summer hotels on the island is filled with guests. I then took the ferry to Lubec and remained all night with a friend, Capt. Myers. He took me for a drive and I saw Pleasant Point, the Maine Indian Reserve. About ten miles distant is the island of Grand Manan which I intended to visit next day when the Grand Manan Steamer Flushing came down from St. Stephen. I have made this letter sufficiently long and next week I will try to give my north shore readers an idea of that wonderful island 200 miles from their homes.

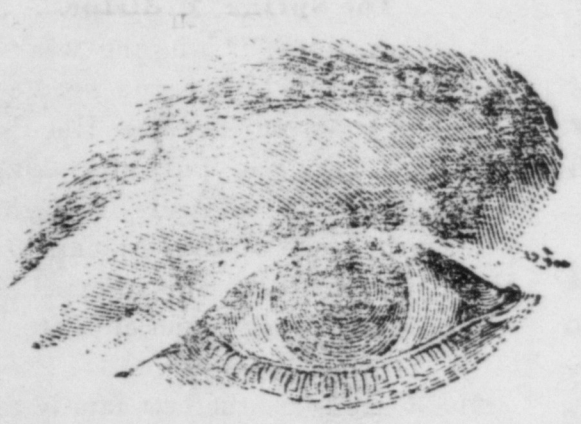

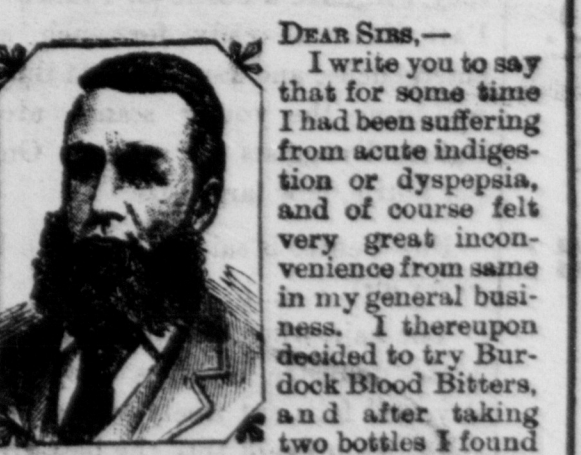

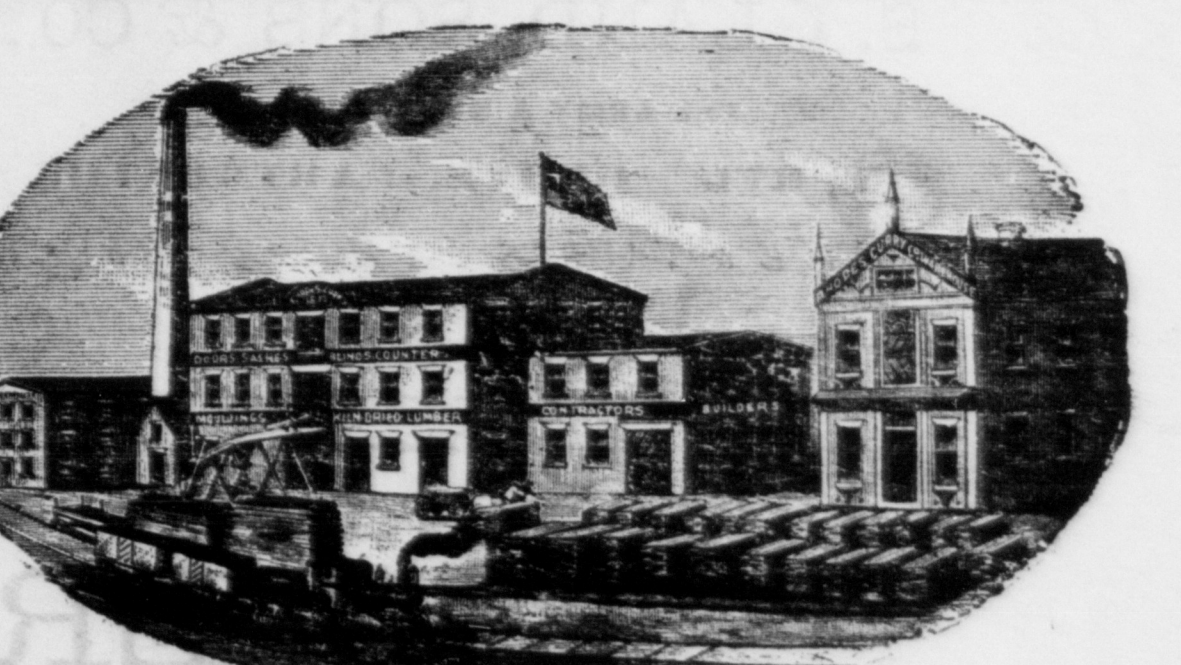
