Last year the north spans were repaired under the direction of bridge inspector Haines, and then it was pointed out to the government that the south spans were also in need of repair.

Goldwin Smith on the Home Rule Situation.

Prof. Goldwin Smith, who has been abroad for about six months, was interviewed at New York, upon his return the other day, respecting the British political situation. The following is an extract from the published report of the interview concerning the home rule question:

"What is to be the fate of home rule for Ireland?" "In the opinion of many the proposition is dead. It is not known whether Lord Roseberry will bring forward the home rule bill again. He has strong imperialistic ideas, and it would not be natural for him to do so unless the Irish members insisted upon it, again held the balance of power and were in a position to make emphatic demands for it.

"Will it be possible to pass the home rule bill if Lord Roseberry brings one forward through the House of Lords?" "That is difficult to say. It is my opinion that if this question were made the single issue in an election, and the same strength in favor of it were returned to parliament, the Lords would give it serious consideration. They would almost necessarily do so. But if in the election the home rule question was combined with two or three or half a dozen other questions then the Lords could fall back upon the argument that this was but an incident and those who favored it in parliament had not come from the people with this as the main question. Under these circumstances the passage of a home rule measure through the House of Lords would be a difficult thing to do.
