The Wilson Bill as amended in the United States Senate is not as great a departure from the McKinley Bill as was anticipated. Under the amended bill eggs are taken from the free list and taxed three cents per dozen The duty on potatoes is now placed at 15 cents per bushel, instead of the ad valorem rate in the bill as it stood before amendment. Butter is four cents per pound, which is the rate that prevailed before the McKinley bill. Hay is restored to the rate of two dollars per ton, which is only one-half the present duty. Outside of the agricultural schedules there are some changes of local interest. Lime has been changed once more, and is now placed at the prohibitive rate of five cents per 100 pounds.


