COCAGNE STONE QUARRIES.—Work at the Kent stone quarries at Cocagne has been resumed. Mr. Edgar S. Stevens, the manager, has removed to Cocagne. He has already made several shipments and enquiries for stone are larger than at any time since the quarries were opened. So far only 7 or 8 men are employed, but ground is cleared to employ a force of 50 or more and the force will be increased to fill all orders promptly.—Times.

A FORMER BUCTOUCHE PASTOR.—Mr. Henry Berthe of Buctouche recently received a letter from his uncle Rev. Father Berthe who was in charge of the Buctouche parish for some years previous to 1864. Father Berthe is now the cure of a parish in one of the French cantons of Switzerland—his former home. Despite his advanced age, he still enjoys good health. He was ordained priest about forty years ago, and bids fair to exceed a half century in the service of the church.

WEDDING.—At Nelson, Miranichi, on Monday, April 23rd, William J. Roman of that place was married to Catharine, daughter of James McDermott, of Main River, Kent County. The Rev. Father Power of Nelson, officiated. The groom was assisted by his brother, M. Roman, and the bride was attended by Miss Foley. The bride and bridesmaid were dressed in navy blue serge with hats and veils to match. After the service the happy couple returned to Mrs. John Fitzpatrick's, aunt of the bride, where music was furnished and a very pleasant evening spent.

KENT NAMES ON OLD MAPS.—A Transcript correspondent writes:—Some of the geographical names familiar to the people of Kent County are older than is generally supposed. In the cartographical collection of the New York Lenox Library, which is said to be richer in old maps, manuscripts and rare books than any other in America, a number of old maps of this province and adjacent territory were inspected by a New Brunswicker recently. One of these curious looking publications, dated at London, 1710 shows "I. Cocagne" as one of its few names on the eastern coast. It outlined the province very crudely and imperfectly, but a few of the main features were tolerably correct. A still older map, published by S. Sampson, Paris, in 1681, shows a river named the "Regibouchou," which is clearly identical with the Richibucto of the present day.

THE BUCTOUCHE RAILWAY BRIDGE GOES DOWN.—Some excitement and alarm was caused in Buctouche last week by the collapse of the railway bridge. The train from Moncton had reached the bridge, and as usual the engine went around the "y" to the rear of the train to push the cars across the bridge. Suddenly the engine left the rails and went through the superstructure of the bridge, bringing up on the pier about three feet below. The cars, which contained quite a number of passengers, had reached a place of safety on the new section of the bridge, and fortunately neither of the men on the engine were injured. As the second engine owned by the road is now in the shop undergoing repairs, it was necessary to get one of the engines off the Central Railway. Only a few days ago the bridge was inspected by a Dominion Government engineer and pronounced in good condition.

LAW AT HARCOURT.—At Harcourt Thursday the case of Catherine McDermott executrix of the last will and testament of James McDermott, vs. Robert Atkinson, an action of assumption came up before the magistrate of that place. The plaintiff elected to become nonsuit: ground informality.

The case of Alexander Murray vs. John Beck came up in review before Judge Wells, at Moncton, Friday. This case was tried before Justice Gordon Livingston at Harcourt on April 27th last, and a verdict found for plaintiff for \$23.00. This action was on a conditional bill of exchange, the defendant contending that the condition was never fulfilled to enable plaintiff to maintain this action. Geo. P. Thomas for plaintiff, and J. deVeber Neales for defendant. Judge Wells delivered judgment Saturday and ordered that the verdict be set aside and a nonsuit entered.

AN INVITATION TO RICHIBUCTO YACHTSMEN.—At a meeting of the Miranichi Yacht Club held in Chatham last week the following races were decided upon: June 2. Race from Newcastle to Chatham and return. July 19. Triangular race off Chatham. Aug. 16. Race, Chatham to Oak Point and return, for the Stewart Championship pennant (now held by Leang). Sept. 13. Triangular race off Newcastle. Sept. 29. Race, Chatham to Newcastle and return.

The Regatta Committee was authorized to invite Richibucto yachtsmen to sail in one of the races, and to offer a purse, to which the Club will contribute \$25, as an inducement. It was understood that small cash prizes may be given, in addition to cups or other trophies that may be offered, if Club funds permit.

—The weather during the past week has been cold and disagreeable. Snow fell Tuesday morning.

—Mr. Johnson, representing Thos. L. Bourque, liquor merchant of St. John, was in town Monday.

—The Buctouche and Moncton train will run Thursday. It will resume its regular trips next week. —The liabilities of Philias E. Gallant of Acadaville is about \$1000. His stock was sold at public auction Tuesday.

—Messrs. J. & T. Jardine's barque Sagona, Captain Thompson, arrived at this port from Liverpool last Wednesday. —Mr. Jas. C. McPhail, formerly of Buctouche, died at Alberton, Prince Co., P. E. I., on the fifth inst., aged 63 years.

—In the St. John Circuit Court last week damages were assessed in the case of Daniel & Boyd vs. C. Bourke at \$716.11. —Mrs. Martin died at Kingston, Saturday, aged 74. Her remains were interred in the Kingston burying ground, Monday.

—The high winds of the last week have interfered with the lobster fishing. Many of the fishermen have not yet got out their traps. —Mr. E. E. Phair, formerly of the K. N. R., has removed from Nelson to Kaslo, B. C. He has taken charge of the leading hotel in Kaslo.

—Mr. Allan Hains, jr., has purchased the Bliss property on Pagan Street, and moved into it. Mr. Henry Irving has moved into the Bell house.

—Mr. Wm. J. Bowser, formerly of Kingston, is running as an independent candidate for the provincial legislature for Vancouver, British Columbia. —Mr. Peter King has removed his saw-mill from St. Mary to Buctouche. He is setting it up a short distance below the railway bridge, and will begin sawing in a few days.

—Thursday was "Fair day" in St. Louis. A very large crowd was in attendance to get seed oats. Over 4000 bushels were dealt out and about 200 teams went away empty. —Mr. Robert Phinney has purchased the shop formerly occupied by Edward Carney, and has moved it near his tannery on Court Street. He is fitting it up as a boot and shoe shop.

—Mr. Hugh McEachrane of Kouchibouguac, will sell his stock, farming tools and household furniture at public auction on Wednesday, May 30th. Mr. McEachrane intends removing to the United States. —Joseph Young, who was sentenced at Bathurst four months ago by Judge Wilkinson to six months in jail for breaking into Red Pine station, escaped on Thursday night through the lavatory. He has not yet been re-captured.

—Transparent fabrics for pretty dresses are daily gaining ground, and we only require the warm sun of this week to crowd the counters where dotted and printed swisses, organdies, lawns, mulls and nainsooks are sold. People are getting ready for a warm summer. See Daniel & Robertson's advertisement. —A Buctouche correspondent writes: Great dissatisfaction is being felt in Buctouche over the new government regulation by which nobody is allowed to have oysters in his possession during the close season, which commences on first of June. Mr. Barnes, the chief buyer, has refused to buy any more oysters from the fishermen, as he now has as many as he can dispose of before that time. His business amounts to about \$5,000 annually. The result is it makes a close season of nearly all spring.

—Alexander Gray, of Perth, Victoria Co., and Miss Robinson, aged 18, of Bathurst, went for a drive to Madawaska on May 2nd, leaving there the same afternoon to return home. At midnight Gray called at the residence of S. Holden, some distance away, saying that he was lost and asking them to help him find his horse. The horse was found after a search, but no trace of the girl can be found. The Perth authorities were asked to arrest Gray but he has also disappeared. The affair has created a sensation.

—Mr. David D. Johnson's carriage factory at Harcourt has been running at full blast this season and is turning out some fine work. Already sixteen carriages have been painted and repaired, and the workmanship has been pronounced first class.
