**Marriage and Divorce.**  
 In twenty years Canada has had but 116 divorces.  
 Desertion is the most common cause of divorce in Sweden.  
 Scotland has fifteen divorces to every 1,000,000 in population.  
 In eighty-five years there have been in France 22,865,000 marriages.  
 Many States forbid marriage between white and Chinese persons.  
 Paris has nearly one half of the divorces granted in all France.  
 In Austria 14 is the legal age of marriage for both men and women.  
 The average age of widowers when re-marrying is 42, of widows 39.  
 The most common cause for divorce in Italy is cruelty from the husband.  
 Italy in the last twelve years has had 2,573,000 marriages and 6690 divorces.  
 The marriage of first cousins is forbidden in fourteen States and territories.  
 There are at the present day 62,062 divorced persons living in Germany.  
 All marriages in England must be celebrated before 3 o'clock in the afternoon.  
 Hellogabalus divorced one of his wives because she had a mole on her shoulder.  
 In Colorado a wife was granted a divorce because her husband cut off her bangs.  
 The greater portion of divorced people in France are between 40 and 50 years of age.  
 Twenty-two States forbid by law the marriage of step-children with their step-parents.  
 The minimum age fixed for marriage in Sparta was 30 for a man and 20 for a woman.  
 Twenty-five States and Territories forbid marriage between white and "colored" people.  
 Aristotle said that the proper age for marriage was 37 for a man and 16 for a woman.  
 In no other country has the marriage rate declined so greatly in recent years as in Ireland.  
 The greater portion of divorces take place between the fifth and tenth year of married life.  
 In almost every country the greater number of divorces is granted at the petition of the wife.  
 In Siam the first wife may be divorced, but cannot be sold, the other wives may be both divorced and sold.  
 In Cochinchina the breaking of a pair of chopsticks in the presence of the couple is a legal form of divorce.  
 Little Denmark is great in the matter of divorce, there being thirty-seven divorces to every 1000 marriages.  
 In Ohio a divorce was recently granted because "the defendant pulled this plaintiff out of bed by his whiskers."  
 According to the statistics of Mr. Carroll D. Wright there is one divorce to every 479 marriages in the United States.  
 Switzerland has the greatest number of divorces as proportioned to marriages of any country in Europe—468 to 10,000.  
 The marriages with the deceased wife's sister or husband's brother numbered in France, in 1885, 355 per 100,000 marriages.  
 A decree was granted in Massachusetts because "the defendant keeps this plaintiff awake most of the night quarreling."  
 Roman law allowed divorce for three causes: the scriptural reason, designs on a husband's life and the possession of false keys.  
 An Indiana applicant testified that "my wife would not walk with me on Sundays and pulled a tuft of hair out of my head."  
 One Greek state had a law that if a man divorced his wife, he could not marry a woman younger than his discarded partner.  
 A Wisconsin man got a divorce because his wife kept a servant girl who spit on the frying pan to see if it was hot enough to fry.  
 A Virginia wife was set free because "the defendant does not come home until 10 p. m., and then keeps the plaintiff awake talking."  
 Statistics of most countries seem to show that consanguineous marriage increase the number of insane, deaf, dumb and blind children.  
 A New Jersey wife got a divorce because "the defendant, the husband, sleeps with a razor under his pillow to frighten this plaintiff."  
 A Tennessee court liberated a wife because "the defendant does not wash himself, thereby causing the plaintiff great mental anguish."  
 Marriage is a contract, but offers from all others in that it is the only contract minors can make which in a court of law will be held good.  
 The Greeks had two forms of divorce: sending away, going away; in the first the wife being dismissed, in the second her leaving was voluntary.  
 A Michigan wife was released because the husband did not provide the necessities of life, saying "he would not work his toenails off for any woman."  
 A Connecticut man got a divorce because "the defendant would not get up in the morning, nor call this plaintiff, nor do anything she was told."  
 In Pennsylvania a henpecked husband

was relieved from the yoke of matrimony because "the defendant struck this plaintiff a violent blow with her bustle."  
 Darwin says that 450 per 10,000 marriages among the English nobility are between blood relatives, and over 19 per cent. of such marriages are childless.  
 In Illinois a decree was obtained by a long suffering husband because during the past year the defendant struck this plaintiff repeatedly with pokers, flat-irons and other hard substances."  
 A New York wife was granted a divorce because her husband threw the baby at her when she hit him with the coal bucket for spitting on the stove.  
 In Minnesota a decree was given to the wife because "the defendant never cuts his toe-nails, and, being restless in his sleep, scratches this plaintiff severely."  
 A Missouri divorce was once granted because "the defendant goes gadding about leaving this plaintiff supperless, or if he gets any he has to cook it himself."  
 The most frequent cause for divorce granted by the Greek Church is "disappearance." Over two-thirds of the whole number of divorces are granted for this reason.  
 In twenty years prior to 1886 the United Kingdom had 6587 divorces; Russia, 21,976; France, 57,116; Germany, 93,818; all Europe, 258,332; the United States, 328,716.  
 Of 1549 marriages contracted in Prussia in 1889 between blood relations, 1422 were between cousins, 110 between uncles and nieces and 16 between aunts and nephews.

**Good Horses Always Sell.**  
 Don't think you can make anything by saving the service fees of your mares this year because horses are low. Some farmers, at least, are not in the frame of mind to listen to reason on this subject. Horses do not sell any lower than any other produce comparatively. The common kinds of cattle are dull, everybody knows the condition of sheep, and hogs are about all there is left in which there is any money.  
 Suppose that horse breeders go out of the business and undertake something else. Will they raise what? If they do, can they be assured of any more profit? What was never so low as it is now. The same is true of all other grains. A study of market quotations will show conclusively that no one is in any better condition than the farmer.  
 Horse breeders can bear one fact in mind as a guide. There is little, if any complaint, from those who have bred to superior stallions. The speed speculative market is discouraging, but blood and performance, especially if combined, bring profitable returns. Good draft animals are taken at prices which leave the breeder a profit. Good gaited saddle horses are in active demand and stylish carriage horses are sought at figures which pay well.  
 If you are satisfied that you know nothing about horse breeding, get out of the business without delay. If you are opposed to paying a good price for the service of a good stallion you better leave horse raising to some one else who has money to burn. If you think a horse is merely a horse you have missed your calling and better quit before the sheriff levies upon your possessions.  
 But the man who has a well-sorted group of mares, who understands how to mate mares and stallions so as to secure a given type, who isn't afraid to risk something on high-class stallion fees, will succeed, even in face of present discouragements. Merit will always bring good prices whatever the conditions of the business may be.—Farm and Home.
