The Governor-in-Council has decided to change the sentence of death pronounced on the deaf mute Wheary to imprisonment for life. The changing of the sentence appears to give general satisfaction, as it is believed that the man is not mentally whole, and should not be called upon to suffer death for the crime he committed.

The priests present represented all parts of the diocese. Father Mehan, of Moncton, said the first prayers. Bishop Rogers, assisted by Fathers Pelletier and Morrissy, celebrated high mass. Father Casey, of St. John, preached a beautiful sermon and the prayers at the grave were read by the dead priest's brother, Father Edward J. Bannon, of Richibucto. All classes and creeds were represented. Members of the C. M. B. A. and temperance societies proceeded the hearse to the grave and St. Patrick's band played a dead march. Father Bannon was a general favorite and the Bishop has the sympathy of all in the loss of his faithful and zealous chancellor.

The Hon. A. G. Blair was waited upon to-day by a committee of ladies of the W. O. T. U., consisting of Mrs. E. Manning, Mrs. J. R. Calhoun and Mrs. Fiske, who asked him to support a measure for the enfranchisement of women such as has been referred to before. This is in fact to give women the right to vote in all Provincial matters such as men now enjoy. There was a long conversation upon the subject, but Mr. Blair is reported to have told them that he could not see his way clear at this time to give them any promise. He felt constrained, he thought to stand upon the position that it would be unwise to do in this province what had not yet been tried in the old civilizations like that of England. Certainly as he felt at this moment, he could not promote the legislation which they sought, much as he sympathized with their desires for the elevation of their sex.—Globe.
