The Richibucto pilots say that the water on the bar is fully six inches deeper than last year. The Central Hotel property at Harcourt sold by foreclosure sale last week brought \$1400. St. John has had another fire. The loss is probably \$250,000; insurance about half that amount. A. C. Chapman defeated H. H. Atkinson by a majority of 40 in the aldermanic election at Moncton on Monday. Over 100 persons were drowned by the recent flooding of the Fraser River valley, B. C. An immense amount of property was destroyed. Lobsters slackened off during the latter part of last week but are again coming in thicker. The boats averaged more than 1000 Monday and Tuesday. Orders for fresh caught salmon left at the house of R. W. Beers, in town, will be filled on Monday and Thursday evenings at the lowest market prices. Trotting races will take place in the Kingston Driving Park, on Thursday, the twelfth day of July next. Full particulars will appear in this paper and on posters later. The County scholarship for the County of Kent in the University of New Brunswick of the value of \$82.50 and tenable for two years, is open to matriculants next fall. The road between Kingston and Richibucto has received some much needed repairs. The bridges to which we last week directed attention have also been put in better condition. Mr. James McDougall, collector of district school rates is around with his little bills. A visit from Mr. Robert Cochran, collector of county rates may also be expected at any time. Mr. Wm. J. He expresses himself as well satisfied with the standing of the schools throughout the county, notwithstanding that this is the season of the year when the attendance is the smallest. The article in last week's REVIEW calling attention to the new Act in reference to travelling peddlers will probably arouse the authorities to take steps to get rid of these nuisances, or make them comply with the provisions of the law before attempting to dispose of their wares.
