DAIRYING IN KENT.—Professor Robertson, the Dominion government dairy expert addressed a meeting in the new butter factory at Buctouche, Monday evening of last week, and another at St. Nicholas River bridge, Tuesday. Both meetings were largely attended by representative farmers and others interested in dairying. The people of the county are awakening to the fact that dairying will be a short time be one of the staple industries of the county.

Prof. Robertson gave an interesting talk on the advantages of dairying and the most profitable means of utilizing the new factory. He showed clearly the advantages of the co-operative factory system over the old plan of individual butter making. It would obtain more butter, he said, from the same amount of milk and would turn out a better and more uniform product, thus ensuring higher prices, but, above all, it would be an immense boon to the farmer's wife by abolishing an immense amount of drudgery. A farmer who compelled his wife to do the churning was a far behind the times as if he made boards out of logs with a hand saw, instead of taking them to a mill. After the June grass faded, the cows should be fed on green oats and other grasses of that description, which by regulating the time of planting, might be cut green until the middle of September. After that, corn in the stock ought to furnish good milk-producing food until Christmas. The advantages of the silo were pointed out and a cheap method of constructing one explained. Kent County, Prof. Robertson declared, could lead almost any part of the Dominion for dairying purposes. Some peculiar quality in the soil or the sea air, probably the latter—imparted a delicate flavor to the butter that would ensure the highest prices as soon as it became generally known. It was that which enabled the St. Louis factory to win such high honors at the World's Fair, and the same quality would doubtless be noticeable in the Buctouche butter.

Newfoundland Notes.

The contest that was fought out on Tuesday and was declared yesterday, was by all odds the hottest and most important that has taken place in Newfoundland for the last forty years. Not only was the existence of the present Government at stake on the result of this election, but the credit of the colony was in the utmost jeopardy of being completely ruined.

The Whiteway party with a shortsightedness and folly that is almost incredible, had refused to pass the supply bill unless the governor would lend himself to be the instrument in their hands of whitewashing their party. The bluff, honest, old Irishmen refused to do anything of the sort and said the indicted members should stand their trials. The resignation of the Whiteway people was a surprise all round as the Opposition had not a quorum if the speaker resigned. However, acting under the leadership of Morine, who is a man of very uncommon ability, they formed a Government with only one-third of the house as a following. They wanted yet a man of having the quorum required by law and they resolved to attempt the most difficult constituency on the Island, where last fall they were most disastrously defeated. They issued the writs at once although it was most difficult in inducing candidates to run in their interest. Messrs. Ayre and McPherson, two respectable merchants, at last consented to lead to what most people considered at the best a forlorn hope, and the fight began.

The writer has seen something of political animosity both in Canada and the States but all that he ever saw or heard was tame and conciliating and most respectful, alongside of what he heard, read and saw here. Being situated at the time in the midst of the agitated districts, he saw and heard more of the seamy side of Newfoundland life than falls to the lot of but few life long residents of the island. Nothing that malignity or private spite could imagine, or ingenuity invent was left undone or unsaid by either parties. It must however be admitted that in this the Whiteway people bore off the palm. Not from any particular quality on the part of their leaders, but rather that as the Goodridge Morine party is called the merchant's party, it is supported by the very large majority of the intelligence and wealth on the island and with these people it would not do to use the same tactics and arguments that would be effective in the other camp. On the other side as Whiteway and Bond poise as champions of the once (and sometimes even yet) oppressed fishermen and their following is more remarkable for enthusiasm than for intelligence, they can use with perfect safety tactics that would not be tolerated anywhere else. One argument the unscrupulous rascal in politics in Newfoundland has always near at hand. Since the Harbor Grace riots the element of religious bigotry and intolerance always sleeps very lightly and can be easily awakened. This demon has been frequently invoked when matters were in doubt by both parties. How this can be done by sane men who know all the terrible effects that are always liable to follow passes comprehension. The people living as they do in little groups are far more likely to be led into doing wrong in the hour of excitement than when they have more varied experience of life. While very kind hearted they are very fierce under excitement. This element was again called into requisition during the present fight. The writer has taken some pains to find out the truth and is satisfied that it was not the ignorant dwellers at Gull Island, not the O'Neils, Doyles and Delaneys that were to blame for the murderous attack made on Morine, Morrison and their party. The real culprits were in St. John's and Harbor Grace and they were not called by Irish names nor are they Roman Catholics. They move in the higher walks of life and attend Protestant services on Sunday. They used the ignorant men of Gull Island while they stood in the background. Their tactics have however been pretty well exposed.

The result of the election has shown pretty conclusively that the Goodridge Morine party will carry the island. It they could elect a man and come so near to electing two where they had only be-

tween thirty and forty per cent. of the votes last fall, they can carry a majority of the island. The weather still continues cold and dry. The grass and other crops have, in consequence, a backward appearance.

Large quantities of salmon have been caught during the last four days. Most of them weigh from thirty to forty pounds.

The fine new dwelling house of Mr. G. Murchie, New Mills, was destroyed by fire on the night of the 24th inst., which was caused by a defect in the chimney.

The recent heavy rains have greatly revived the parched crops and the drooping hearts of the farmers.

A fortnight ago many large salmon were caught. For several days lately heavy eastern winds have prevailed and driven the fish to deep water, so that very few have been caught. The nets in exposed situations have been filled with sea-weed, and will require much labor to clear them.

Mr. W. Blake, Black Point, while fishing his net while a heavy sea rolled, fell overboard when his boat drifted from him. He held on for a considerable time, and was nearly exhausted before he was seen from the shore and rescued.

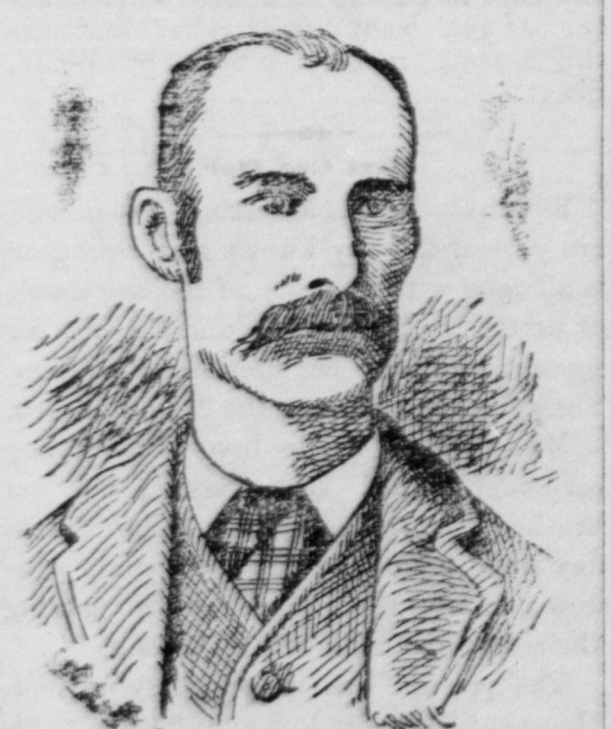
