

LOCAL NEWS.

HERRING PLENTIFUL.—Immense catches of herring are being made all along the coast. James Lagoof, with one boat and two men caught 200 barrels in two days. Other boats secured as many as forty barrels last week. They were disposed of to the lobster packers at \$1.00 per barrel.

BRIDGES DOWN.—The south span of the Buctouche bridge fifty feet in length, fell in Friday night last by the ice coming in contact with the pier on which the span rested. The south span of the Cocagne bridge has also fallen. The collapse of these bridges will greatly interfere with travel between Shediac and Buctouche.

PROVINCIAL APPOINTMENTS FOR THE COUNTY OF KENT.—Jonathan Forster, Louis Gosselin, Narcisse B. Leger, Pierre T. Gogain, Philip Arsenau, Fabien J. Cormier and Maxime J. O. LeBlanc, to be Justices of the Peace. Louis Leger to be a Commissioner of the Parish of Dundas Civil Court. Clifford Atkinson to be a Coroner.

DERELICT PASSED.—Barque Bessie Markham, Capt. Stewart, from Liverpool on Saturday, had several heavy gales. On April 10, in lat. 41.24, lon. 35.51 W., derelict of about 500 tons was passed. She appeared to be a long time in the water, as everything was gone to the water's edge. On April 14, in lat. 41.17 N., lon. 38.22 W., an object supposed to be a ship's boat was seen.—Globe.

TYPHOID FEVER IN BUCTOUCHE.—A number of cases of typhoid fever are reported at Buctouche. A. D. Cormier and three of his family are down with the disease. A daughter of Jude J. LeBlanc, Collector of Customs, who has been very ill is recovering. A young woman named LeBlanc died from the disease, and was buried Monday. There is a great deal of sickness in and around the town. There were three funerals one day last week.

THE REVISING BARRISTER.—The Monteur Acadien thinks it would have been wiser to have appointed Judge Wells revising barrister for Kent, instead of giving the position to Mr. Robert Hutchinson. The Monteur's opinion is not shared by the people of this county. Judge Wells would not doubt have filled the office worthily, but not more so than Mr. Hutchinson, who is acquainted with every locality in the county, and with nearly every person. The appointment of a local man to the position gives general satisfaction.

A BAD CUT.—A man named Maximine LeBlanc, of St. Paul, Kent Co., met with a very severe accident Thursday evening. He was engaged in splitting wood before the door and in striking a stick he drove the axe clean through the wood and into his right leg, cutting both bones. Dr. LeBlanc, of Buctouche, who was summoned and dressed the wound at first thought the leg would have to be amputated. Dr. Bourque, of Moncton, was summoned in consultation and it was decided to try and save the limb. The cut is about half way between the knee and ankle. LeBlanc is a married man about 35 years of age.

OF INTEREST TO THE OWNERS OF TUGS.—An Ottawa despatch says: "It is understood that the act respecting the examination of masters and mates on tugboats will be amended this session by striking out the provisions requiring servitude for three years, and providing for an examination in reading and writing, the color test, and the furnishing of certificates as to general character." This amendment, if adopted, will virtually do away with the present law, and will allow owners to choose what men they think suitable to take charge of their boats.

—A number of girls came over the K. N. R., Monday, on their way to the beaches to work in the lobster factories. —Mr. A. R. Wetmore, provincial government engineer went to Buctouche to report on the condition of the bridge.

—The handsome quartered oak rail for main stairway of the St. John Custom House, was made by the A. Christie Wood Working Co. —N. A. Landry has been appointed Revising Barrister for the County of Gloucester, in the place of the late T. Swayne DesBrisay, deceased.

—The Miramichi Advance has advised that Mr. Adams, M. P., has intimated that he will not offer for re-election. The condition of his health will not permit him to do so.

—The contract for the erection of the new public hall, Kingston, has not yet been let owing to a change which the trustees have decided upon in the plan of the building.

—Phileas E. Gallant, trader, of Acadiaville, Kent Co., has assigned to Mark Gallant of the same place. The trust deed lies at the office of Geo. P. Thomas solicitor, Moncton.

—Mr. Wm. Dickinson, late of the Merchants Bank of Halifax, Newcastle, arrived Monday, to take his place in the Kingston agency. Mr. Walker has been removed to Newcastle.

—A heavy thunderstorm visited Kent County on Wednesday last week. No damage was done in this vicinity. A barn in McLaughlin road was struck by the lightning and badly shattered.

—The work of unseating the members of the Legislature in Newfoundland goes on, another member of the government and a supporter having been unseated, and disqualified, by Chief Justice Carter.

—Mr. A. Hains of Marysville, government inspector, was in town Friday. He went up the river Saturday to inspect Main River bridge. He left Monday for Miramichi to inspect the Douglastown bridge.

—Dr. Thomas Byrne, the small pox patient at Sussex, is gradually improving, and all have no doubts of his recovery. The scare has greatly subsided and fully a third of the population there have been successfully vaccinated.

—Mr. W. W. Short was called to St. John, Friday, by the death of his sister-in-law, Mrs. C. K. Short. The following account of her death is given in the Globe: —The sudden and unexpected death of Mrs. Charles K. Short, at an early hour this morning, was the cause of great regret among her many friends as soon as the sad news became known. The circumstances are of a peculiarly sad nature. She had just given birth to a child and was attended only by a nurse, Dr. H. G. Addy, who had been hastily summoned, not having arrived. As she had been enjoying excellent health up to the time of her confinement no apprehension was felt. But she suddenly cried "Oh, I'm dying" and in a few moments expired. Dr. Addy arrived a few moments later, but she had then drawn her last breath. Death is supposed to have been caused by the rupture of a blood vessel.
