REMORDED DISSEMINATIONS IN THE PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT.

Extract From Official Report in the House of Assembly.

(Official Report.)

FREDERICTON, March 20.—Dr. Stockton said that as Hon. M. Mitchell had referred to rumored resignations, he (Stockton) would ask if there was any truth in the rumor that Hon. Messrs Tweedie and White had resigned.

Hon. Mr. Blair assured his friends opposite that their expectations regarding the vacancies would have to remain unrealized for the present at least. (Laughter.) He would tell them with all candor that no vacancies existed for their acceptance. (Laughter.)

Hon. Mr. Tweedie said he had nothing to add to the statement made by the attorney general. He wished, however, to read the following letter, which he had received, and which, to some extent, explained the anxiety of some honorable gentlemen opposite:

From Silas Alward, Esq., Q. C., D. C. L., M. P. P., S. John, N. B.:
