evidence produced, their denial will have little weight. The facts brought to light will confirm the suspicions long entertained by many thoughtful people in every constituency, who have watched Mr. Blair's career, that he and his friends are prepared to resort to any expedient to raise election funds to keep the government in power. Serious charges have frequently been made against the government which have been accepted as well founded by those who have had the opportunity to carefully investigate them, but in the majority of cases it has been found difficult to bring home the proof with sufficient clearness to convince independent men disposed to take a charitable view of matters Where a doubt existed they gave Mr. Blair the benefit of it. 

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
