

LOCAL NEWS.

NEW POST OFFICE.—A new post office has been established at McLean settlement on the McLaughlin Road. Mr. Hugh McLean will be post master.

SAID TO BE DYING.—Rev. E. J. Bannon left Sunday for Chatham where he has been called by the serious illness of his brother, Rev. T. J. Bannon.

LOST A COAT.—Mr. Martin Lanigan lost a valuable coat last week. Wednesday he let it out to play, and in running through the deep snow it was badly cut in the breast by a stake. It died Saturday.

SEVERE COLD.—The Record says the thermometer dropped to 41° below zero in Sussex on Wednesday of last week. Richibucto, Wednesday morning it 31° below—the coldest day of the season.

LOST HIS FINGER.—James Cady whose finger was badly injured in the Masonic Hall a short time ago, decided to have it amputated. The operation was performed Thursday by Dr. W. A. Ferguson. John Fitzpatrick is attending to the tonorial wants of Mr. Cady's customers during the latter's illness.

SUDDEN DEATH.—Mr. Wm. Carter died at Kouchibouguac last week. He had been in poor health for some time and on Thursday took a violent pain in his head. Dr. Olloqui was summoned from Kingston, but before he arrived, Carter was dead. His brother Robert Carter, arrived home from the States Tuesday.

HORSE RACING AT BUCTOUCHE.—A number of the sporting men of Buctouche intend clearing a track and getting the ice in condition for a trotting race there in the early part of next month. It is the intention to have three races, a 2.40 class, 3 minute class and a gentlemen's driving race; the last open only to horses owned in Kent County.

BUCTOUCHE.—About eighteen inches of snow fell during the last storm. There is much sickness in the parish.

Buctouche is to have a butter and cheese factory next spring. A company has been formed for that purpose. Mr. Michael McLaughlin, proprietor of the Memramcook creamery has four men employed in storing ice to be used in the business. He expects a good patronage next summer.

DRIFTS FIFTEEN FEET HIGH.—The storm which set in last Thursday evening was the worst of the season, and has completely blocked the K. N. R. The train started out in the morning with about 60 men on board to endeavour to clear the track of the drifts which had been piled up by the previous storm. It succeeded in reaching the Junction in the evening but in the meantime the storm had set in and to return was impossible. The engine too gave out and nothing was left the men but to return on foot. They reached town on Saturday, a sorry looking crowd. Several had their ears frozen, one man had his foot frozen, another was snow blind, and all were completely worn out. They report drifts on the track over fifteen feet high. It is not likely the road will be reopened for some time.

The hurricane that swept over the northern part of Germany caused a large loss of life. Six fishing boats belonging to Rindertort, a small village on the Baltic Sea were lost in the storm and 22 men drowned. Eighty crafts of various descriptions sank in the river Elbe. 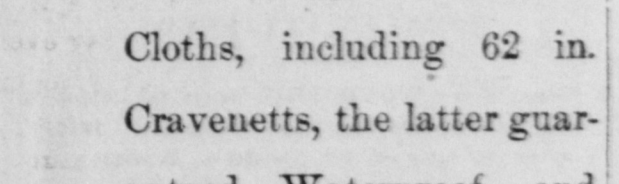
