A great deal of the stock, Mr. Mott says, is only saleable in winter and the delay, therefore, depreciates its value. Regarding the trustee, Mr. Lingley, he said he had not sought the position and was to-day ready to resign in favor or anyone agreeable to the creditors. -Globe.




