THE BLAIR-WILSON QUINN COR-RUPTION

The St. John Telegraph and Moncton Transcript have, doubtless, at the instance of Mr. Blair, simultaneously been given a commission to issue supplements containing the report of the investigation of this scandal before a special committee of the Legislature last session. The particular object to be accomplished just at the present time by the publication is not very clear, unless it be to enable the party organs to swell their printing bills against the government. The evidence, taken all all together, and especially that of Mr. Quinn and Mr. Wilson, reveals a most unpleasant state of affairs and shows the way in which political support has hitherto been secured in York County by the Blair-Wilson combination, through the bartering of public offices. These methods have, however, at last failed, and Mr. Blair has been driven from the constituency which he for years represented and which, had he pursued an upright and honorable course, he could undoubtedly have continued to represent; while his colleagues, Wilson, Colter and Anderson have been relegated to private life, never again, in all probability, to occupy seats in the Legislature. It is by just such serious charges as those disclosed by Mr. Quinn under oath, that this result has been brought about, and no amount of white-washing by partizan committees or party votes in the Legislature, can convince the people of York County that these complaints, and numerous others of a like character are not wellfounded. The enquiry was, it is true, limited and restricted in every possible way. Mr. Blair framed his own indictment, appointed his own committee, prepared or suggested the report, and then drew up the white-washing resolution founded on the report, and compelled his followers to vote for it under the snap of the party lash, even to the extent of accepting statements in reference to the conduct of members of the Opposition which were characterized by them as absolutely untrue and admitted to be utterly unparliamentary and unjustifiable. Notwithstanding all this, the damaging evidence remains, and Mr. Quinn's charges of corrupt dealing with public offices and money contributions exacted therefor, are sustained. An effort is made in the "Supplements" to create sympathy for Mr. Blair, by flaming head lines characterizing the enquiry as "the Stockton-Phinney-Pitts Conspiracy against the Attorney
