—Reports from several parts of the county are to the effect that horn flies are attacking and killing cattle. They congregate in immense numbers on the horns of the animals near the head and along their sides and deposit a maggot which very often eats into the cattle's heads and kills them.

—The report that Mr. D. W. Grierson and little Lottie Irving were lost in the woods brought out a number of men last Thursday night armed with tin whistles and lanterns to search for the missing ones. The two had started in the woods to search for the cows and darkness having overtaken them they were unable to find their way out. The searching party returned about one o'clock, after a fruitless search. Next morning shortly after daylight the missing ones put in an appearance not much the worse for their adventure.

—Died at Marinette, Wisconsin, U. S. A., on Sunday, the 29th day of July, 1894, William Wall, a native of Kingston, Kent County, N. B., but for the last 14 years a resident of Marinette, Wis. He was a ship carpenter by occupation and for many years worked in the employ of Messrs. J. & T. Jardine. He was married to Jane Beattie, a sister of Mr. William Beattie, and a daughter of the late James Beattie, of Kingston, Kent. He was a very kind inoffensive man and was very highly respected by all who knew him, who will now hear of his death with deep regret. He was in his 68th year.

—We have been informed of an error which occurred in our issue of the 19th of July, where we cited Mr. George Dunbar, of Dublin, Ire., who has written 250 words per minute as being the world's fastest shorthand writer. But Mr. Isaac S. Dement, of Chicago, wrote that number of words per minute in the celebrated Lake George speed contest in 1888. Since that time Mr. Dement has written faster and faster, and in July of last year he wrote from dictation 397 words of unfamiliar matter in one minute, clearly demonstrating that he has no superiors and few if any equals. Mr. Dement is editor of the National Stenographer and Dictation, the latter being printed entirely in shorthand.

—Mr. R. Hutchinson, revising barrister, for the County of Kent, last week began the revision of the Dominion electoral lists. The assessment roll will be the basis of the preliminary list. The revising barrister takes from the assessment books the names of all persons qualified to vote in Dominion elections, and up to the 15th of October he will receive applications from persons who are qualified to vote, but whose names do not appear on the assessment lists. Every person has the right to be registered who is of age and a British subject, who owns real estate in a town of the value of \$200, or real estate in the country districts of the value of \$150. Persons not owning real estate can also qualify if they pay a monthly rent of \$2 or a yearly rent of \$20 and have paid that amount of rent for one year. Farmers' sons living at home are also qualified to be registered under certain conditions, also any person in the receipt of an income of \$200 in money or money's worth, or partly in money and partly in money's worth.

—We regret to be compelled to hold over interesting letters from Ottawa, and elsewhere, and correspondence from Cocagne, Kent Junction and other points which reached us too late for this issue. We are most obliged to our friends for their interesting items and trust they will continue their favours.

—The Chatham World had the following to say about the Wallace Hopper Company in that town:—The Wallace Hopper Co. are giving a series of fine performances in Masonic Hall. The order of procession embraced all classes, including school children, peasantry, tradesmen, factory hands carrying wreaths, district officials, Governor of the district and foreign representatives. The chief mourners were Major General Estance Hill, Mr. W. Standish Lowe, Mr. Montague Ainslie and Mr. F. W. Hepburn. Telegrams and letters of condolence were received by the family from a very large number of prominent personages and officials and from friends of the deceased in many places including Mr. George K. McLeod, of St. John; and more than fifty wreaths from intimate friends, family connections, societies, and the workmen engaged in the factories were forwarded to Zupange as a token of the respect in which Mr. Miller was held.

Senator Foley came from poor but honest parents, and he worked himself up to the position he occupied in the most honorable way. Hartley, who killed Foley, declined to make any statement as to the circumstances which led to the shooting. The murdered man was president of the bank of Nevada.
