Public examinations were held in Richibucto Thursday and Friday. A number of visitors were present. -Adolphus Robichaud, who keeps a small grocery shop in Buctouche, has assigned to E. The liabilities are two or three hundred dollars. -At the Military School in Fredericton last week, seven officers, who have completed the short term course, received certificates. Amongst the number was 2nd Lieut. Frank D. Phinney of the 73rd Northumberland Battalion. -There were over 500 applications this year from students in various parts of the province for admission to the Normal School. The examinations are taking place at the several examining stations throughout the province this week. -Mr. J. C. Miller has learned by cable that his cousin Walter C. Miller, who will be remembered as having been here in the service of the Miller Tanning Extract Co., died suddenly on Friday of this week. He was in Austria when last heard from. Walter was very popular with all who met him either in business or society. -Miss Minnie Marsh and David C. Marsh, of Bass River, passed successful examinations at the Deaf and Dumb Institution at Fredericton last week. During the year 37 pupils have been in attendance at the institution, of whom nine were from Queens county, seven from Kent, four from Westmorland, four from St. John, three from Kings, three from Charlotte, two from Carleton, two from Restigouche, and one each from Albert York and Northumberland. -The Bathurst Schools are to be heard from again. The committee from the Grand Orange Lodge having the matter in hand met on Wednesday and after fully discussing the situation adopted a resolution that steps be taken to have a legal test of the present method of administering the school system. Just what course will be taken is not known, but Mr. C. N. Skinner, the legal adviser of the committee, was instructed to move in the way that to him seemed best likely to secure a full examination into the present system. There is a rumor that the matter will come up by way of a suit in the Equity Court. -St. John Globe. -Messrs Alexander McDonald, R. T. Riley and J. H. Brock, of Winnipeg, representatives of the Great West Life Insurance Company of that city, are now in Halifax. This is the company that has just concluded the purchase of the entire business of the Dominion Safety Fund Association, amounting to a million and a half of dollars. The transfer dates from the first of June, but it will probably be September and perhaps later before the Dominion Safety Fund Association is able to complete all the changes of policies and wind up its affairs. Just what arrangements the new company will make to carry on its business is not known, but it is probable a board of managers for the Maritime Provinces will be appointed with headquarters either in this city or in Halifax. The present agents of the Dominion Safety Fund Association will likely be retained to continue the business. -Globe.

-There was a fair attendance of outsiders to see the Dominion Day sports. -The evening the proceedings were enhanced by a number of street fight. Notwithstanding the number of magistrates and constables in the town there appears to be no one to look after those disturbing the peace, and the street rowdy has it his own way in Richibucto. -The ladies of St. Aloisius' church, Richibucto, intend holding a strawberry festival and fancy table at St. Patrick's Hall, on the 10th and 11th July, inst. Proceeds to go towards paying off the debt on the new organ recently purchased for the church. Doors open each day at 3 p. m. Admission 10 cents. Music and Singing will be furnished each evening. -In Richibucto Division Sons of Temperance, No. 42, the officers for the ensuing quarter are as follows:—J. M. O'Brien, W. P.; Miss Allen, W. A.; Florence A. Caie, R. S.; Nina L. Frecker, A. R. S.; Nene Black, F. S.; R. Phinney, Treasurer; John Scott Sr., Chaplain; Sophia Thompson, C.; Dot Phinney, A. C.; Jessie White I. S.; Samuel Paterson, O. S.; A. Hains, Sr., P. W. P.; Miss Allen, Organist. -Marin Girouard, 100 years of age, and one of the surviving pensioners of the war of 1812, died at the home of his son in St. Mary, on Friday last. The grandfather of deceased, Gervais Girouard, was for some time, after the expulsion of the Acadians, a political prisoner at Halifax. On being relieved he removed to Pays Bas, a French settlement above Fredericton, afterwards locating on the Albert side of the Petitcodiac river near Moncton and then in Kent county, where Marin was born in 1794. He was for 18 years in receipt of a pension from the Dominion government. -As a train on the Salisbury and Harvey R. R. was crossing a bridge over the river between Albert and Harvey, Friday, the central span of the bridge gave away, precipitating the postal and passenger cars into the bottom of the river, about thirty feet below. The engine reached the other side safely. There were four passengers, two brakemen, a postal clerk and Conductor Downing in the cars. One of the passengers, Miss Coonan, of Harvey, was cut and bruised in the face, and received other bruises on the body, but no bones were broken nor was there any internal injury. The others were bruised and cut but were not seriously injured. -A terrible accident occurred Sunday evening on the C. P. R. about fifteen miles from Moosehead. The accident was caused by the collapse of a section of the trestle over the western outlet of Moosehead Lake and within a mile or so of Moosehead station. This trestle, built of wood like the others on the line, was fifteen or twenty feet high and two hundred and thirty-four feet long. The engine, tender, postal car, baggage car and a second-class passenger car went through and piled one on top of the other on the bottom. The driver was killed instantly, and his fireman was terribly injured. Next to the engine was the postal car. In it were two clerks, Walter Starkie and John G. Miller, of Richibucto. It is probable they were in their berths asleep at the time and that the fall threw them out. Mr. Starkie was killed, and Miller was somewhat injured, but so far as known, not at all seriously. His escape is considered marvelous, but it is likely he was thrown against some of the mail bags, thus breaking his fall. Three passengers were killed and a number of persons injured. -The University Concert Co., of Mount Allison College gave their popular entertainment in Temperance Hall, Richibucto, Monday evening, July 2nd. The concert was far beyond what the people expected. They had with them almost all the apparatus found in a modern gymnasium.
