Sun Dance.

On Saturday and Sunday last the In-
dians on Piapot's Muscowpetung's and
Pasqua's reserves united in holding their
annual sun dance, in the Qu'Appelle
Valley, about thirty-five miles northeast
of Regina. There were over one thousand
Indians, men, women and children,
assembled, and the usual performance was
gone through, with the exception of the
making of braves, which appears to be
pretty well abandoned by these bands.
However, the savage was there in all his
glory, painted in vermilion and bedecked
with feathers, gaudy colored cloth, in
pristine splendor. The tents of the In-
dians were pitched in a circle on the plain,
and in the center of the circular space was
a large tent in which the dance was held.

The Indians entered into the ceremony
with an earnestness which showed that
it was one which appealed to them with a
wonderful power. Between the dances a
chief or prominent man would harangue
the crowd sitting around, explaining the
object of the dance, and offer up a sort of
prayer to the hot, burning sun. Many of
the Indians kept up the dance until they
sank exhausted with the heat, when others
would take their places. Several of them
danced continuously from Saturday
morning until Sunday evening, without
food or drink. There was no disturbance
of any kind during the dance, and Inspec-
tor Scarth and his two policemen, who
had gone out to maintain order, had no
occasion to interfere during the two days.
In fact the inspector said the Indians were
all well behaved. The following descrip-
tion of the sun dance from the Battleford
Herald is interesting:

"The Crees of the north will hold a
Thirst Dance, accompanied by the mak-
ing of braves, at Jackfish Lake, to-mor-
row and following days. These dances
are generally referred to as Sun dances,
but here they are called Thirst dances—
a name more in keeping with the proceed-
ings accompanying them. At one of these
dances recently held in the south, Little
Bear, the head chief, is reported as having
given the following explanation of in-
origin and object:

"In the springtime, when the children
of Manitou are sick and the grass is
coming up and the trees putting forth
their leaves, we dance the sun dance that
we may be made well and to thank
Manitou for the things that grow. The
priest of the white man at certain times
fasts for several days, so we Crees likewise
fast and think of Manitou. The white
man kneels and prays to his God, we
dance before Manitou. It is our church
and our preaching. The young men listen
to me, and I instruct them in the ways of
our fathers. My father and father-in-law
and other old men of our race told me to
take their places when they were gone
and teach the people to make the sun-
dance in the spring, and that day the
next spring to dance again. We Crees
meet to punish ourselves for our sins.
For days and nights before the dance
we eat nothing and grow very thin. The
men sit apart on one side of the lodge
the women sit on the other. All think
of Manitou. Then the old men go into
the woods, and selecting a growing tree,
report to the lodge, going from tepee
to tepee singing the songs of Manitou.
The people form a procession on horse-
back, the young men with guns and bows
and the squaws sitting behind them on the
ponies. They move forward to the tree,
and dismounting, gather about it singing
and dancing. As the tree is falling the
leaves discharge their weapons, shooting
it down to show their happiness at the
leaves growing again. At the camp we
set up the tree, making stalls in which
naked warriors, screened to the waist,
dance until they fall, and up above we
weave a roof of willows. When all has
been done the young men come to me
and ask that they may be put to the test.
I cut slits in the skin of their arms, run
small sticks through and on these hang
weights by strings. I make medicine over
them, which keeps the wounds from festering.
We dance two days and two nights
without stopping, and as one man falls
another takes his place. We ask that
white men keep everyone from giving our
people whiskey, as no drunken man can
take part in the dance."—Regina Leader.

The Megantic Outlaw.
Very pathetic were the closing events in
the life of Donald Morrison, of Megantic.
Our readers will recall how a few years
ago, Morrison, who had resisted ejection
from his farm in Megantic, shot the bailiff,
and for nearly a year defied arrest. The
sympathy of the sturdy Scotch yeomanry
was wholly upon his side, and they would
afford no assistance to the law officers in
making his arrest. Finally the legal
authorities of the province were invoked,
and a strong detachment of police from
Montreal was dispatched to the district
and succeeded, after many ineffectual at-
tempts, in locating and capturing the man.
He was tried, convicted and sentenced to
the penitentiary for life. It is said the
jury only rendered a verdict of guilty
upon the understanding that he would
receive but a short term sentence. After
a few years of confinement Morrison's
health broke down, and it was announced
recently that he would die. At this point
the Caledonian Society, of Montreal, was
asked to interfere in his behalf; they took
up the case and sued the Crown to have
mercy, and urged that he be relieved of
the stigma of dying in prison. Their plea
prevailed, and Morrison was pardoned.
He was met by influential citizens, and
taken to Victoria Hospital, Montreal,
where he died within a few days of his
arrival.

The Caledonian and St. Andrew's societies
took charge of the remains. A handsome
rosewood casket enclosed the body, and a
delegation accompanied it to his late home
in Milan, and amid expressions of deep
and universal sorrow the body of the
Megantic outlaw was laid to rest.

Morrison's crime never appeared to his
neighbors as one to be visited by penalty,
yet the local sentiment was not permitted
to govern in such a case. The law of the
province had been broken and its majesty
must be vindicated. The resources of the
authorities must be exhausted ere the
crime remain unpunished.

Sentiment can easily excuse the poor
Scotch peasant who fought for his home
against the 'j-croter. Shall his crime be
punished and the terrible liquor traffic be
privileged to carry on its work of death?
Shall local sentiment be permitted to
determine the enforcement of the
law against the men who are, in
violation of law, carrying on their nefarious
liquor traffic. Shall the Provincial re-
sources be exhausted to effect the arrest
and punishment of poor Morrison, and at
the same time the authorities proclaim
their inability to enforce the law against
the illicit liquor traffic? As the enforce-
ment of the law was not, in this case, left
to local sentiment, so, we urge, neither
shall the enforcement of the license laws
be determined by the sympathy of those
who are its victims, for the trade. The
practice in this case may well be adopted
as the rule in all cases.

An Unnatural Son.
SALEM, Neb., June 19.—Twenty-five
men took Martin Thayer, a young man,
from the streets of Salem to the Fair
grounds one night this week, where they
stripped him of his clothing and applied
a liberal coat of tar and feathers, and
warned him never again to make his ap-
pearance in this town. The day before
the fellow had allowed his aged and in-
valid father to be taken the poor house
while he was known to have \$100 in his
possession during the week.
