

LOCAL NEWS.

TO FLOAT THE VALONA.—An effort will be made in a few days to get the Barque Valona off the South Beach where she was driven by the storm last October.

PRESENTED TO REV. J. S. ALLEN.—A number of the members of the congregation of Rev. J. S. Allen presented him with a set of harness last Saturday evening.

CONCERT.—A phonograph concert will be given in the Temperance Hall, Richibucto, on Thursday evening. The Phonograph is run by electricity and the hand-bills declare "sings, talks and laughs most beautifully like a person."

BROKE HIS COLLAR BONE.—Richard Cunningham, the fourteen year old son of the late Captain Cunningham, broke his collar bone while wrestling with another lad on the street, Saturday.

AN EXPENSIVE COURT.—Last term of the County Court was the most expensive Court held here for some time. The cost attached to the several criminal causes will amount to nearly \$1000. The witness fees in the Goguen case alone, are nearly \$200.

LECTURES.—Dr. Cadioux's lecture on Temperance advertised to take place last week, had to be postponed owing to the blockade of the Kent Northern Railway. The lecturer arrived Monday, and delivered two very forcible and instructive lectures on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings.

AN UNFOUNDED RUMOR.—A report was in circulation last week to the effect that a man named McDonald, formerly of the I. C. R., had been arrested at Wolford in connection with the murder of the Englishman whose body was found at the foot of the Sugar Loaf mountain at Campbellton some years ago. Just how the rumor gained currency is unknown but it appears to have been entirely without foundation.

COMMITTED TO JAIL.—A complaint was laid before Stipendiary Magistrate Richardson last week by William Eddy, of Jardineville, charging Thomas Eddy, his son, with having used threatening language towards him. The hearing took place Monday and Eddy was ordered to provide bonds to keep the peace. In default of bail he was committed to jail for two months. It is believed that he is insane.

CANDLEMAS DAY.—Last Friday was Candlemas Day, or as known in church circles, the feast of the Purification. On this day winter is popularly supposed to be half over and half the wood and coal for winter should be gone. There is an old superstition that if Candlemas Day is fine and bright the most severe part of the winter is to come. Friday was a beautiful day, and if there is any foundation for this superstition we may expect some winter weather yet.

MARRIED.—At St. Charles, Kent Co., January 29th, by Rev. Fr. Venner, Mr. Fred Davids to Miss Salome Daigle. The bride was assisted by Miss Elizabeth Daigle the bridegroom being supported by Mr. David Daigle. After the ceremony the bridal party drove to the bride's residence, where a tempting dinner was served, and a number of invited guests awaited them. In the evening the happy couple drove to their home in Richibucto, where a large number of friends were assembled to receive them. Tea was served at six, after which amusements followed and the guests departed with best wishes for the future happiness of the young couple.

THE KENT NORTHERN.—An accident was narrowly averted on the Kent Northern Railway last Thursday. The storm had blocked up the road and on Thursday morning a train consisting of two engines, a snow plow and a tender, with about forty men on board, started out to clear the track. While crossing the Mill dam Bridge between town and Kings- ton, the trucks under the head engine left the rails. The bridge is about twenty feet high and the engine was kept from plunging over only by the hind engine and the snow plow. Had it gone over it is probable the greater number of those on board would have been killed.

Nays: Councillors Bernard, Poirier, McMaster, Daigle, Murray, Murphy, McAlmon, R. Richa.d, Leger—9. Amendment carried.

—It was intended to have had a meeting of the provincial taxation commission in St. John last week, but it did not materialize. Senator McClelan, the chairman, says they expect to have their report ready for the next session of the legislature. It will be suggestive only, and if the commissioners' suggestions are adopted it will tend towards a more equitable arrangement than that of the present day.

PETER McSWEENEY. —A Newcastle despatch says the storm of last week was the worst experienced there for years; it was a veritable blizzard. The chimney of the old court house, which has known many a tempest within and without the "halls of justice" succumbed to the blast, and lies in a state of otium sine dignitate. Some chimneys on private residences are said to have likewise fallen. Report says two barns were blown down in Derby, and other damage has doubtless been the result through the valley of the Miramichi.

—Monday afternoon the council engaged in the Bathurst school matter had a consultation to see if anything could be done to bring about a settlement. On Tuesday afternoon they met by appointment with Attorney General Blair and Chief Commissioner Emerson to talk the matter over. The consultation was a three-hour one and it is understood the two sides were able to agree on points which, if approved by the people of Bathurst, will make it possible to effect a settlement. The lawyers are understood to have told the government they had no power to commit their clients to any settlement but were working together with the hope that something could be arrived at that would make a settlement possible. —Globe.

—An Ottawa despatch says the government has not decided upon introducing an insolvency bill during the coming session. The draft measure now before the Toronto and Montreal boards of trade for their views is a document of 128 clauses. Power is given to appoint official receivers, who, however, must hold no political positions in the country, and who must provide bonds for not less than \$2,000 and not more than \$20,000. The court to which the case has been referred, and which will have jurisdiction over such matters, will appoint a liquidator and the receiver shall hand over all the books, accounts, etc., to the former. If the debtor fails to make a clear and specific account of his indebtedness, etc., he may be imprisoned for six months. If it be shown that the debtor is about to abscond he can be arrested. All his letters, etc., can also be stopped at the post office by the liquidators for three months and opened in his presence. If the debtor is found to be guilty of any fraud his discharge is held back for five years. If he is found guilty of presenting a false balance sheet a penalty of two years' imprisonment is provided, and if he fails to give up all his property under his control then he is liable to three years imprisonment. In many quarters there is strong opposition to the government dealing with this question.
