WOMEN'S CHRISTIAN TEMPERANCE UNION COLUMN.

And take heed to yourselves, lest at any time your hearts be overcharged with surfeiting and drunkenness and cares of this life, so that day come upon you unawares.—Luke 21, 34.

Paper Read Before the W. C. T. U. Port Elgin.

On the evening of Dec. 22nd, 1873, Dio Lewis, a brother physician and lyceum lecturer, delivered in Music Hall, Hillsboro Ohio, a lecture on "Our girls." He had been engaged some months before to fill one place in the course of lectures, but finding he could remain another evening, it was decided he should give a free lecture on Temperance. Mrs. Thompson says, although Dr. Lewis was his guest, because of home cares which required her presence she did not hear the lecture, but her son, a youth of 17 was present, and upon his return home, related to her in a most earnest manner, the thrilling incidents of the evening, how Dr. Lewis told of his own mother and several good Christian friends uniting in prayer with and for the liquor sellers of his native town, until they gave up their soul destroying business, and said, "Ladies you might do the same thing in Hillsboro if you had the same faith." And then turning to the ministers and temperance men upon the platform, added, "Suppose I ask the ladies to signify their opinion upon the subject?" They all bowed their consent, and fifty or more women stood up in token of approval. He then asked the gentlemen how many of them would stand as backers, and 60 or 70 arose. "And now mother," said my boy, "they have got you into business, for you are on some committee to do work at the Presbyterian church in the morning and then the ladies expect you to go with them to the saloons." My husband who seemed to be half asleep in the lounge, raised himself up upon his elbow and said, "What tomfoolery is all that?" I consoled him with the promise to be led into any foolish act, but added, "If the Lord should show me that it was His will for the women to visit places where liquor was sold and drank, I should not shrink from it," my husband continuing to call the whole plan as he understood it "tomfoolery." I ventured to remind him that the men had been in the tomfoolery business a long time, and it might be God's will that the women should now take their part. Nothing further was said upon the subject until after breakfast next morning, when we all gathered in the "family room." First my son, gently placing his hand upon my shoulder said in a subdued tone, "Mother are you not going over to the church this morning?" As I hesitated he added, "But my dear mother, you know you have to go." Then my daughter, leaning over in a most tender manner and looking up into my face, said, "Don't you think you will go?" All this time my husband had been walking the floor, uttering not a word. He stopped, and laying his hand upon the family Bible, said with emphasis, "Children you know where you mother goes to settle all vexed questions, let us leave her alone. I turned the key and was in the act of kneeling before God and his holy word, when I heard a gentle tap at the door. Upon opening it I saw my daughter with her little Bible open, and the tears coursing down her cheeks as she said, "I opened to this mother, it must be for you," and she left me to read the wonderful message of the great "I am," contained in the 146th Psalm. As I read, new meaning seemed to attach to those promises and the Spirit said, This is the way, walk ye in it. No longer doubting, I quickly repaired to the Presbyterian church and took my seat near the door. Several of my lady friends came and urged me to go up to the front. While hesitating I was unanimously chosen

president or leader, Mrs. Geo. McDowell, vice-president and Mrs. D. K. Lenner, secretary of the strange work that was to follow. Noticing the embarrassment of the women, Dr. McSorley pastor of the Presbyterian church, said, "I believe the ladies will do nothing until the gentlemen of the audience leave the house, let us adjourn and leave this work with God and the women." I walked to the minister's table, strength unknown before coming to me, took the large Bible and opening it, explained the incidents of the morning; then read the 146th Psalm and commented upon its new meaning to me. I then called upon Mrs. McDowell to lead in prayer, and such a prayer, she who had never heard her own voice in prayer before. It seemed as if "live coals" from off the altar had touched her lips. As we rose from our knees, a grand good singer of the olden time started, "Give to the winds thy fears," as we formed in line two and two, proceeding at once to our sacred mission, trusting alone in the God of Jacob. On we marched in solemn silence looking neither to the right or left until we arrived at the drug store of Dr. Wm. Smith, when Mrs. Milton Boyd proceeded to read "the appeal," others were visited. Some willingly, others unwillingly signed the druggist's pledge, and some assured the ladies of their good wishes, while a few postponed their decision. At this time there were four hotels, four drugstores, and thirteen saloons where intoxicating liquors could be obtained. Promptly at 9 o'clock next a. m., this noble band of women assembled at the Presbyterian church for prayer and to renew their consecration vows, then forming in procession proceeded to visit hotels and saloons. Mrs. Thompson was appointed to present the appeal to those.
