THE WILSON BILL PASSES.**The Vote Stood Yeas 203, Nays 140.**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—In the House today the tariff bill was passed. Mr. Reed spoke against the Wilson bill, and Messrs. Crisp and Wilson spoke in its favor. At the end of Mr. Wilson's speech great enthusiasm was manifested in the galleries and on the floor. A crowd of his admirers carried Mr. Wilson to the committee room on their shoulders. The amendment was adopted raising duty on barley from 20 per cent. ad valorem and on barley malt from 30 per cent. to 35 per cent. The date of the taking effect of the wool schedule was fixed for Aug. 2nd, Dec. 2nd for striking off provision regarding reciprocity on petroleum, internal revenue, and the amendment including the in one tax feature; the latter by a vote of 182 to 50. The speaker then put the question "shall the bill pass," yeas and nays demanded. Roll called amidst the most intense interest. The vote was announced at 5:55; yeas 203, nays 140. The bill was declared passed and a wild shout went up from the floor and galleries. Later examination of the vote showed 204 voted for the bill including the speaker. The announcement was greeted with cheering and applause which continued until the house adjourned. The absentees on the vote numbered 13.

Mr. Stevens, member of the committee on Ways and Means, did not vote. The usual motions to reconsider and lay on the table were made by Mr. Wilson and carried. The house adjourned.

The Senate debated the resolution declaring illegal secretary Carlisle's proposed bond issue.

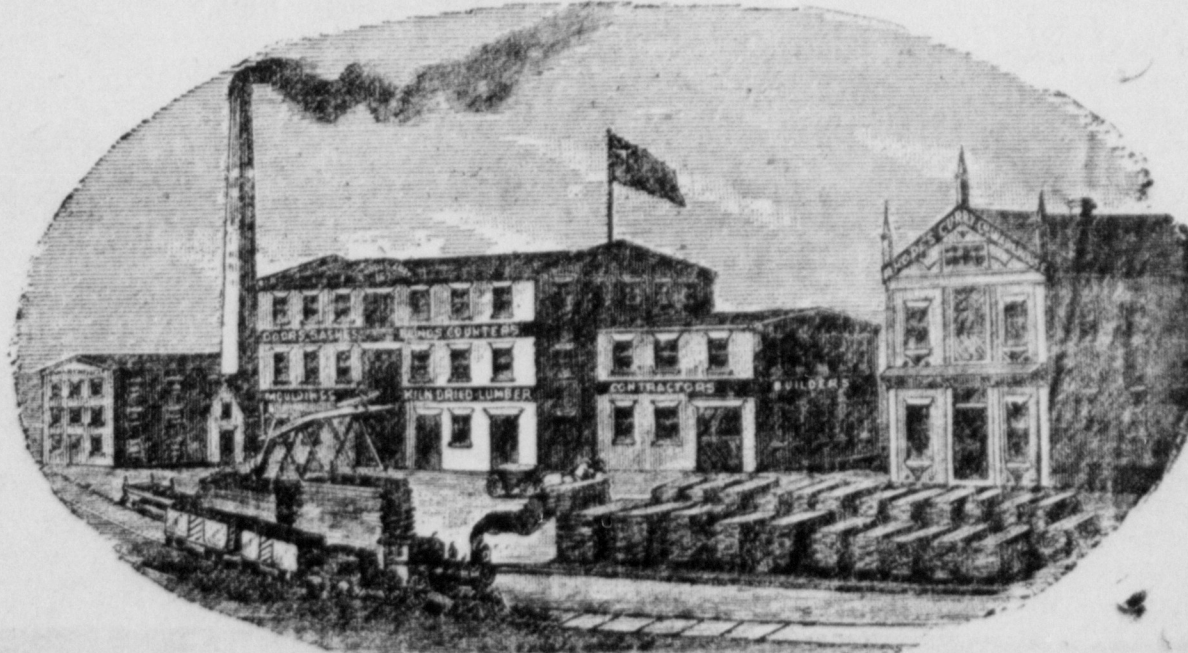
