from it and put to cook in boiling water and a trifle of salt.

Heavy suppers and excitement are the principal disturbers of sleep. Take a light supper an hour or two before bedtime, and engage in reading or something of a soothing nature, some time before retiring.

To make potato starch pudding, take one quart of milk, boiling hot, put four tablespoonfuls of potato starch, three eggs, and a little salt, well mixed and beaten together, and your pudding is made. To be served with rich sauce.

Slightly moisten a handful of bran, and use it instead of the tea-leaves in sweeping the carpets. The bran not only gathers up the dust, but brightens the colors of the material. Don't use too hard a brush or sweep too vigorously.

For a swollen toe joint soak in warm water in which a handful of salt is dissolved. Dissolve as much salt in a quart bottle of hot water as the water will take up, and use this as a lotion. Wet several thicknesses of linen to use as a pad, pour on it four drops of arnica extract, apply the arnica side to the joint, and cover with a bandage. Easy fitting boots or shoes are essential.

Why Oysters are Brain Food.
Urging the use of oysters as food, an exchange says: "Speaking roughly, a quart of oysters contains, on the average, about the same quantity of actual nutritive substance as a quart of milk, or a pound of very lean beef, or a pound and a half of fresh cod-fish, or two-thirds of a pound of bread. But while the weight of actual nutriment in the different quantities of food material is very nearly the same, the quality is widely different. That of the very lean meat or codfish, consists mostly of what are called in chemical language protein compounds, or 'flesh-formers'—the substances which make blood, muscle, tendon, bone, brain and other nitrogenous tissues. That of the bread consists chiefly of starch, with a little of these and other compounds, which serve the body as fuel, and supply it with heat and muscular power. The nutritive substance of oysters contain considerable of both the flesh-forming and the more especially heat and foreviging ingredients."
