

LOCAL NEWS.

POSTPONED.—Owing to unfavorable weather the drive to Buctouche planned for last Wednesday evening had to be postponed.

ACCIDENT.—One day last week, Mr. Wm. Sullivan, of St. Nicholas River, fell on the ice and fractured his thigh. Dr. Olliqui set the fracture.

THE B. & M. RAILWAY.—A Dominion government engineer will go over the Buctouche & Moncton Railway this week to report on the condition of the road.

THE STORM.—Tuesday's storm was the wildest of the season. The Kent Northern train did not attempt to reach the Junction Tuesday or Wednesday. Roads are again blocked.

BANK CHANGES.—Mr. Wm. Dickinson of the Merchants Bank, Kingston, has been transferred to the Newcastle branch. Mr. Walker of Newcastle, takes his place in Kingston.

OFF TO DORCHESTER.—The two prisoners, William Gould and Sylvain P. Goguen left for Dorchester Monday, in charge of Sheriff Leger. The Sheriff returned Tuesday after having given his men into the safe keeping of Warden Forster.

CHARGE NOT SUSTAINED.—The hearing of Frank Curran charged with stealing or maliciously destroying the smelt net of Angus Durant, took place before Stipendiary Magistrate Richardson Thursday. The case lasted all day Thursday and part of Friday. The magistrate held that the evidence was insufficient and the charge was dismissed.

OBITUARY.—Mr. Angus McDonald died at Denver, Colorado, on Nov. 14th, aged 80 years. The deceased was a native of Fort William, Scotland, and came to Miramichi when only two years old. He resided in Richibucto for a number of years, and removed to Colorado in 1865. He leaves a widow and three sons.

LECTURE.—Dr. J. N. Cadioux, of New York, will deliver lectures Wednesday and Thursday, in the Temperance Hall, Richibucto. Subjects: A Struggle for Life and The Liquor Problem. Admission 20 cents. Children half-price. Dr. Cadioux will make chemical experiments to prove that alcoholic liquors are hurtful to the human system.

LOST A \$20.00 BILL.—Mr. Basil E. Johnson thought himself \$20.00 poorer last Friday evening than he was in the morning. In handling some money on the street, he managed to drop a \$20.00 bill. A search was made, but the bill failed to turn up and Mr. Johnson made up his mind that he had seen the last of it. The missing money was found next day by Mr. Frecker, and returned to the owner.

EVIDENCE TAKEN.—A hearing in the matter of the charges preferred by John Taylor against Hugh M. Ferguson, J. P., of Kingston, took place before Surveyor General Tweedie at Kingston, Monday. C. J. Sayre appeared for Mr. Taylor, and Geo. V. McInerney represented Mr. Ferguson. The evidence will be laid before the local government at its next session.

A BASS RIVER LETTER.—We have received a letter from a Bass River correspondent referring to a communication in THE REVIEW of January 11th. The writer declares that the communication is slanderous and altogether unfounded, and that Bass River has never before been so free from rowdiness as it now is. —The last Gazette contained notice of the appointment of Daniel Murray, M. D., as a member of the Board of School Trustees for the town of Campbellton, his term of office having expired, and to be chairman of the said Board.

—The Normal school at Fredericton has 210 students enrolled now, and of this number only 10 are in the French department under charge of Prof. Belliveau. One hundred and five of the students who entered in September were examined for third class licenses in December, and it is understood that out of this number 10 or 12 failed to secure a license. Since Christmas 37 teachers have entered for advanced license, which bring the total up to 210. George S. Inch, who is temporarily on the staff, has charge of the mathematics and English subjects in two classes.

—There seems to be a misunderstanding on the part of the outside public as to the offence for which Sylvain P. Goguen was convicted. The indictment contained six counts, five of which alleged the discharging a gun with a malicious intent by the accused. The sixth count alleged an unlawful shooting without intent to do harm, and on this count the accused was found guilty and acquitted of all the other charges. The maximum punishment for this offence is three years imprisonment. The jury at first stood 8 to 4 for acquittal on all the counts, but afterwards agreed upon the verdict as rendered.

—Fred Keith, law student in the office of Poirier & McCully, Moncton, was placed under arrest on a serious charge. The law library of Joseph A. Harris, barrister, was seized some time ago by the sheriff. Later it was discovered that several hundred dollars worth of valuable books did not appear in the sheriff's inventory. Keith had been employed by the sheriff to assist in making the inventory, and had pilloined books, marked off Harris's name and put on his own. He then tried to sell them, and this led to his discovery. His residence was searched, the books found, and he was held in \$500 bail. The case was called Friday in the police court, but Keith did not appear. It is reported he has skipped.

—Dr. Smith, physician of Tracadie lepers' hospital, in his annual report says there are on the register to-day twenty patients, eleven males and nine females. Eleven of these are in the first or early stages of the malady, six in the second and three in the third or final stage. There were six deaths during the year, and four new cases were admitted. Of those admitted two came from Lower Caraque, one from Shippegan parish, and one from the parish of St. Isadore, all in the county of Gloucester, New Brunswick. "I have again to report, as I have reported for several years past, there are none this year from Tracadie. I believe we have seen the last of the disease here. Those entering the hospital during recent years came from the above mentioned outlying parishes and from the poor class of inhabitants. I find that here as in other countries, poor sanitary surroundings, defective and bad dietetic conditions and uncleanness are important factors in the spread of leprosy. Our lepers are subject to the common ailments of mankind, and I regret to say that there was an unusual amount of sickness in the wards during the year. In addition to some typhoid and rheumatic fever we had a severe epidemic of erysipelas, thirteen of the inmates having been ill with it, some of them several times in succession. Three of the patients already worn out with the ravages of leprosy, succumbed. There can be no doubt that the outbreak of erysipelas was due to the wretched sanitary condition of the Lazaretto. The need of a new building on a more elevated and healthy site is becoming more and more urgent. The behaviour of the inmates was generally good.
