Whereas : It has pleased God who orders all things well, to remove by the hand of Death, our dearly beloved brother, the late Howard Atkinson, and







tants. I find that here as in other countries, poor sanitary surroundings, defective and bad dietetic conditions and uncleanliness are important factors in the spread of leprosy. Our lepers are subject to the common ailments of mankind, and I regret to say that there was an unusual amount of sickness in the wards during the year. In addition to some typhoid and rheumatic fever we had a severe epidemic of erysipelas, thirteen of the inmates having been ill with it, some of them several times in succession. Three of the patients alreany worn out with the ravages of leprosy, succumbed. There can be no doubt that the outbreak of erysipelas was due to the wretched sanitary condition of the Lazaretto. The need of a new building on a more elevated and healthy site is becoming more and more urgent. The behaviour of the inmates was generally good.
