Enforcement of Law.

The Royal Commission on Prohibition, in examining witnesses makes the question, whether a prohibitory law could be enforced in Canada, prominent and important. This, of course, is a point of great moment to be determined in the Moncton. discussion of this question. Just here, however, it is necessary to have a clear definition of the term, enforcing a prohibitory law.

When there is general and open violation of law, it certainly is not enforced. But a law may be broken on a large scale and still the law may be enforced. It is therefore to the interest of those who make, sell and use strong drink to conceal their wrong-doing.

People do not dread the violation of liquor laws as they do those who break other laws. Threves and swindlers are a menace to all persons. No one feels safe when they are about. Direct self-interest creates sentiment in favor of the laws to protect society against them; and there is a strong stimulus felt by the officers appointed to enforce law to see that they are executed. 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
