Enforcement of Law.

The Royal Commission on Prohibition, in examining witnesses makes the question, whether a prohibitory law could be enforced in Canada, prominent and important. This, of course, is a point of great moment to be determined in the discussion of this question. Just here, however, it is necessary to have a clear definition of the term, enforcing a prohibitory law.

When there is general and open violation of law, it certainly is not enforced. But a law may be broken on a large scale and still the law may be enforced. If due diligence and vigilance are observed by the officers of the law, and all who are found breaking it are brought to justice and punished, then the law is enforced, although there may be, through scheming and concealment, many who violate it and are not brought to justice. Every law against crime is violated more or less with impunity. New York is never rid of pick-pockets and thieves. In every city and country place law is violated, and in many instances the offenders are not punished.

In the nature of the case, a prohibitory law will be evaded more than any other law. Rather, the facilities for its violation are peculiar to itself, and give to those who undertake to set its provisions at naught a great advantage over other law breakers. The man who steals finds in the man from whom he steals an active and determined opposer. The man who makes or sells intoxicants, legally has a helper in the man from whom he buys his grain and other essentials, as also in the man employed in the manufacture, traffic and use of the prohibited drink. It is therefore to the interest of those who make, sell and use strong drink to conceal their wrong-doing.

People do not dread the violation of liquor laws as they do those who break other laws. Thieves and swindlers are a menace to all persons. No one feels safe when they are about. Direct self-interest creates sentiment in favor of the laws to protect society against them; and there is a strong stimulus felt by the officers appointed to enforce law to see that they are executed. Offenders are sought out with all diligence and brought to justice. It would take a higher state of moral sentiment to give equal aid to laws against the manufacture, importation, sale and use of intoxicants.

It is not reasonable, therefore, to expect, especially at first, a full and rigid enforcement of a prohibitory liquor law. But the outlawing of it by legislative enactment will cause all who have regard to the respect of the community in which they live, and to their standing among their fellowmen, to withdraw from the business. It will be left to the lawless and disreputable.

If the Dominion government shall take the nominations of the temperance organizations for their officers to enforce a prohibitory law, and exercise the same authority over these appointments as is now done in the case of men employed to execute the revenue laws of the Dominion, a prohibitory liquor law would be enforced in the Dominion of Canada. And the law being enforced, the moral sentiment of the country against the liquor business would become stronger and stronger. Law is an educator, and an educated public sentiment would help more and more in the enforcement of the law.

Understood with the above modifications, it seems to us that every witness, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, who appears before the Royal Commission, and is asked for his opinion as to whether a prohibitory law can be enforced in Canada, would be justified in answering, Yes—Messenger and Visitor.

Wm. A. Pyne Dead.

Wm. A. Pyne, the victim of the railroad accident on last Saturday night died at the hospital last evening about ten o'clock of exhaustion, having been slowly sinking since the time of his accident. His demise was expected earlier, but as he seemed to be stronger than was anticipated it was determined yesterday morning to take the chance of an operation with the possibility that his life might be saved. He bore the operation well, but the shock of the accident had exhausted him and he died last evening. Mr. Pyne resided on Felton street with his mother. He leaves a wife and two children. The body has been removed from the hospital but the time of the funeral has not been announced.

Pyne was born in Needham, Mass., and moved to Waltham when a boy. He graduated from the grammar school and went to work in the A. W. W. Co's case-room, then under charge of Daniel O'Hara.

When the case department removed to Orange, N. J., and became the Crescent Watch Case Co., Pyne went there to work. He remained there until the works closed down and then obtained employment at the Edison Phonograph works. He returned to Waltham six weeks ago. He had no regular employment at the time of his death.—Waltham Paper.

The deceased was born in Kingston, and was a son of the late Charles Pine and nephew of Ephraim Pine of this town and grandson of Mrs. Robert Goldie, Kingston. Mr. Pyne slipped and fell off a train at Waltham station on the night of Dec. 3rd, and received injuries from which he died on the following Thursday.

Which Letter is Oftenest Used.

The letter e is the only letter in the English language which is used oftener than 100 times out of every thousand letters employed. The e stands first also as regards frequency of use in the French, German, Italian and Spanish languages. The following letters are the 10 English ones most frequently used, namely: O of every 1000 letters used, E 137, T 88, O 76, S 75, I 71, R 70, N 66, H 65, A 64, L 40.

As initial letters the order is very different; the order of the ten most frequently so used being: R, S, C, P, A, T, D, M, F, and I.

The four letters most seldom used are z, j, q, and x; while the four least frequently used as initial letters are K, Y, Z, and X.

Other languages would require the various letters in different proportions. In Latin and French q and U would be deficient, h would be in excess, and w would be needless.

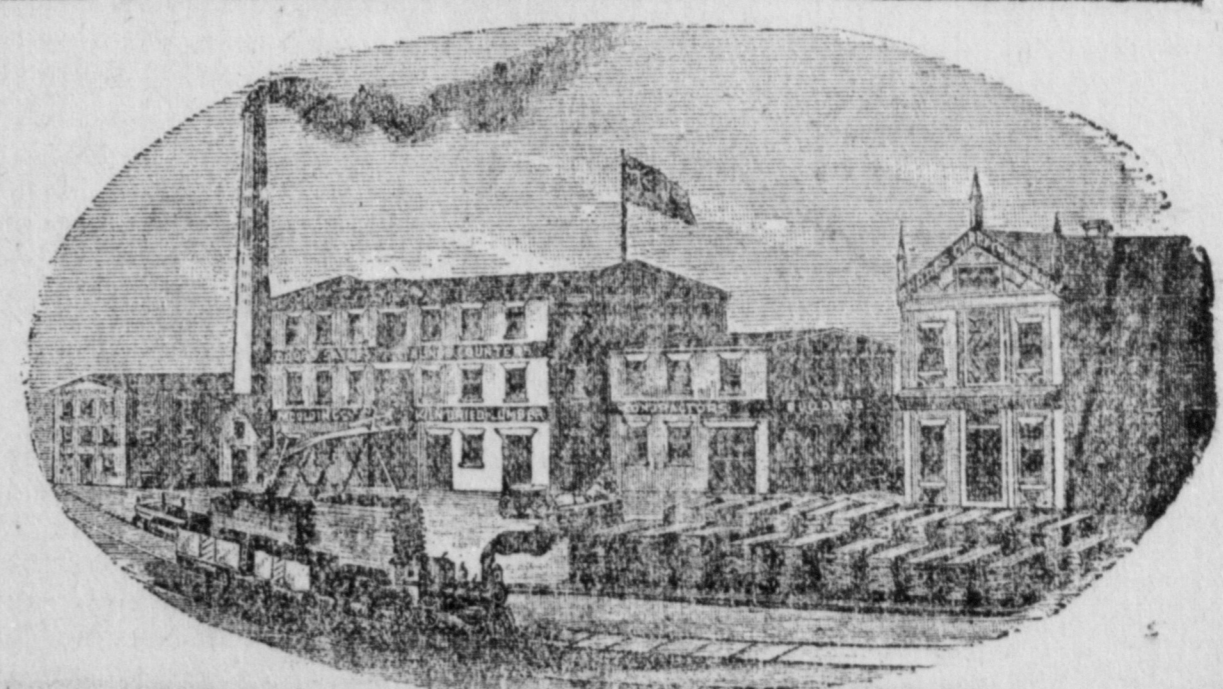
