The country had voted away the Legislative Council on the supposition that a large amount of money would be saved, but the expenditure now was greater than before. In scathing terms Mr. Powell criticized the employment of a law clerk at a large salary when there were two members of the Cabinet, the Attorney General and Solicitor General, paid to do the law work of the country. In his opinion a good lawyer could be secured to do all the country's law work for the salary of the Solicitor General. He declared the stock importations of the government had caused a financial loss of over \$40,000 and then he took up the matter of public printing. He had in his hand a copy of a law book printed at the Globe office for Mr. A. A. Stockton. It was on fine paper and in every respect the workmanship on it was far superior to that on any of the government reports, yet it had not cost anything like as much as had the reports. He was satisfied if the work was put up to public tender that many thousands of dollars would be saved. A matter on which Mr. Powell found considerable fault was the practice of charging bridge construction to capital account. This he considered a heinous crime, but he has never been heard to speak out against the federal government practice of charging I. C. R. construction and rolling stock to capital account. Mr. Powell predicted a deficit next year of \$75,000 or \$80,000 instead of only \$16,000. He strongly urged the government to as far as possible economize and keep their expenditure within their revenue.

Mr. Emmerson argued that the charges for printing were all fair and in the course of his remarks in this connection declared that the past bills submitted by Mr. Pitts for printing had been as heavy in proportion as any of those now complained against. The chief portion of Dr. Alward's address was a defence of himself for having deserted the Liberal party. He said he had worked hard for the Liberal party and had spent his money freely in its interest. He had seen the error of his ways and now thanked heaven that he had had the courage of his convictions. Mr. Russell defended the subsidy and agricultural policy of the government, while Messrs. Pinder and Howe attacked it for its neglect of the agricultural interests. Dr. Stockton offered an amendment to the motion to go into supply to the effect that no burdens should be placed upon the municipalities for the maintenance of their pauper insane. This proposition was seconded by Mr. Shaw in a brief speech. At 12.15 Mr. Killam took the floor and moved the adjournment of the debate. This was agreed to and after a motion that when the House adjourned on Thursday it stand adjourned until Tuesday, at 2.30 o'clock the Speaker left the chair and the first long sitting was at an end.

The co-operation of the Canadian government in the suppression of the Honduras Lottery company in this country has been obtained by the U. S. post office department. Postmaster General Blesset has received a communication from Deputy Postmaster General White of the Dominion of Canada, stating that in accordance with the request recently made by the Canadian officers, all such money offices as exchange with the United States have been instructed not to certify money orders in favor of the lottery company, or any of the persons or concerns mentioned as its representatives. "We are very much gratified," said Assistant Attorney General Thomas to-day, "that the Canadian government and the British government have taken action to keep the lottery out of the country. It will greatly hamper the lottery company's operations."
