A gentleman who saw him at 12 o'clock at night, says he was then so drunk he could hardly stand steady on his feet. Shortly after this he took his boat and started for the schooner which, notwithstanding his condition he succeeded in reaching in safety. He was seen by the steward of the vessel when the latter turned about 1 o'clock leaning over the rail vomiting. Next morning his coat and hat were found lying on the deck of the schooner but he himself was missing. It is thought he must have fallen over about half an hour after the steward left him as some men who were passing on a log raft at that time say they heard a splash but paid no attention to it thinking that they were only throwing something overboard from the schooner. The captain, after spending about an hour fishing for him with a small grapnel proceeded up the river to Kingston. Some ten or twelve boats from Richibucto were out dragging for the body on Sunday but no trace of it could be found.

LATER.

The body of Stewart, the sailor drowned off the schooner "Walter Sumner," was washed ashore last Tuesday night and found near O'Leary's wharf next morning. It was taken to the Public Wharf, where an inquest will be held this (Wednesday) afternoon.
