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THE WEEK'S DOINGS

A Budget of News from
Far and Near.

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NEW BRUNSWICK.

Mrs. Botsford, widow of the late Senator Botsford, died at Sackville last Thursday. The deceased lady, who was over 80 years of age, has been an invalid for the last four or five years.

At the opening of the July term of the Westmorland circuit court, addresses were presented to Justice Vanwart on behalf of the barristers and grand jury, congratulating him on his elevation to the supreme court bench of this province.

Victor Rogi, an Austrian sailor 21 years old, stabbed Charles Crandall, the second mate of the barque Don Enrique, moored at Carleton, St. John. Rogi used some insulting language to Crandall who struck him and Rogi stabbed him in the side. The attempted murderer is now under arrest. Crandall's wound is not considered serious.

Gertrude Beatty, aged twelve, daughter of Samuel Beatty, Needham street, Fredericton, while playing in the yard with a young brother while their parents were away from home last night, was seized with hemorrhage of the lungs. She became frigid and began to screech, as did also her brother. John McNeill, a neighbor, ran over to the yard and, seeing what was the matter, sent for a doctor and took the little girl in his arms, in which position she died in less than ten minutes, before the doctor or her parents arrived.

NOVA SCOTIA.

Prince Gregoire Galitzin, a Russian Prince and a general in the Czar's army in spending a few days in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

A letter from Lord Aberdeen to the civic authorities at Halifax states that, as Lady Aberdeen has arranged to leave England on July 21, and will arrive in Halifax early in the week commencing July 29, he has decided to delay his visit to Halifax a few days, so that their Excellencies may arrive together. He fixes Tuesday, July 31, as the date on which he will receive the civic address.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

An order-in-council has been passed declaring the Scott act in force in Charlottetown on the expiration of the present license, but not earlier than 90 days from June 27th. If no licenses are in force then the act takes effect within thirty days.

A sad accident occurred at Chepstow, recently. The eight year old son of Mr. Gabriel McDonald was in the lobster factory at that place. The owners of the factory were busy boiling lobsters. The boy went up to the loft to remove some cans. Immediately above the boiler there was a hole in the loft which was only covered by a salt bag. Through this hole the boy fell into the boiling water below. He was rescued soon as possible but only survived a few hours after the accident.

QUEBEC.

The Provincial health authorities have commenced a strict investigation into the cases of death reported caused by impure vaccine. St. Foye farm was inspected by Dr. Beaudrey, Provincial health inspector and Dr. Wyatt Johnson, bacteriologist.

Although general orders to that effect have not yet appeared it is now assumed that the four companies of the R. A. C. I. stationed respectively at Toronto, London, St. John's and Fredericton, will be massed into one battalion at Levis, Quebec, towards the end of July or beginning of August.

ONTARIO.

The Senate adopted an address to Her Majesty congratulating her on the birth of a son to the Duke and Duchess of York.

It is reported that the government has decided to dismiss Messrs Kennedy and Parent as a result of the Curran bridge exposures.

An Ottawa despatch says that several arrests will be made on information laid by the government against parties implicated in the Curran bridge frauds. The dismissal of Collingwood Schreiber is also spoken of.

One result of the colonial conference will be the early shipment of a cargo of paper to Melbourne. Hon. Simon Fraser has given an order to E. B. Eddy, of Hull for a supply. Strange, it is to be shipped via London, as the charges by the C. P. R. and Canada-Australia line are too high.

MANITOBA.

W. W. Ogilvie, the flour king, states that the acreage of wheat crop in Manitoba and Northwest will be from three to four million bushels more than last year. Cutting will be general on August 10, if good weather continues, two weeks earlier than last year.

The promoters of the proposed railway from Winnipeg to the east end of the Lake of the Woods are trying to obtain financial assistance from the provincial government. The government does not appear to favor this project, but intimates

that if the line were extended to Lake Superior they would grant aid. This the promoters do not seem prepared to do.

BRITISH COLUMBIA.

It is announced that a start is to be made in August on the extension of the extension of the Esquimalt and Nanaimo Railway to Comox, a distance of ninety miles, to near the northern end of Vancouver Island. The contracts are being let in five mile sections. Importance is attached to this announcement, as it is considered the first step in the line of the British Pacific new transcontinental railway, which it is intended would parallel the Canadian Pacific but running east further north.

NEWFOUNDLAND.

The schooner Diamond, Captain Broprot, arrived at St. John from Boston last Sunday. On the 5th of July she picked up two American fishermen, about 50 miles N. E. of Sable Island, who were cast away from the banker Shenandoan, on the 28th of June. There names are Theodore Wilnough and William Mason. Seven days were spent in their dory, and they were very weak and exhausted when rescued from their perilous situation. Food and water were absent, and for a long time they had to live on some raw halibut which they had secured.

So plentiful are codfish at Dildo and neighborhood that everything that can float has been utilized, and men are out in all sorts of old crafts, patched up and caulked. It is no unusual sight to see one of these old crafts with three men in her, one whose duty it is to bale in order to keep her afloat, while the others are dragging fine codfish out of the water. Men are fishing now who seldom fished before. Unusually large catches of fish have been taken at Silly Cove, New Pelican and Heart's Content. Elderly men say they have not seen the like since they were boys.

UNITED STATES.

Three distinct shocks of earthquake were felt at Memphis, Tenn., recently at 6.30 o'clock.

Mgr. Satolli, apostolic delegate to America, has issued an order recommending the expulsion of liquor dealers from all Catholic societies.

The United States, acting independently of other powers, has made representations to China and Japan to settle the Korean difficulty by arbitration.

Sang Kee and Moy Foy Yen, the two Chinamen who were arrested for smuggling their countrymen into the United States, have escaped from custody and are now in Canada.

The barque Emma T. Crowell left New York Tuesday for Shanghai loaded with 39,332 cases of petroleum. When twelve miles south of Fre Island she was burned to the water's edge. The crew escaped in the boats, losing everything.

The United States cruiser Baltimore has reached Chemulpo, Corea, to remain in Korean waters protecting American interests. The United States wishes, it is reported, to act as an intermediary between China and Japan, in the Korean dispute.

The town of Witmore, in Jessamine county, was visited by a cyclone last week. A dozen persons were injured, one fatally. Nearly every house was either wrecked or damaged. One woman was lifted into the air, carried nearly one hundred feet and thrown against a tree.

Secretary Carlisle has given directions to the mints to resume the coinage of silver dollars. So far about five hundred dollars represent the coinage of 1894, but probably two millions more will be issued the present year. This new coinage will not affect the amount of money in circulation, as for every silver dollar coined a silver certificate will be retired.

The Grand Jury at Buffalo reported an indictment against Henry J. Warren, superintendent of the Barber Asphalt Co., for employing alien labor on city work, contrary to the new laws of 1894, which prohibit the employment of any but citizens of the state or municipality. This is merely a test case and if found guilty Mr. Warren, who is simply indicted as superintendent of the company, will be subject to merely nominal punishment.

The only woman Garbage Inspector of Chicago, Mrs. Paul, is said to be a pronounced success in her recently-acquired office. She actually "inspects," exploring highways and byways, and does not hesitate to watch the "dumps" receiving their refuse loads, which is certainly carrying her sense of duty to an extreme limit. Mrs. Paul is independent of petty politicians, as her salary is not paid by the city, but by the women of the Municipal Order League, at whose instance the authorities have given her power to act.

BRITISH.

Lord Salisbury's Alien Immigrants Bill passed its second reading in the British House of Lords yesterday—53 to 37. In the Commons the Budget Bill was passed finally.

Lord Rosebery, since he won the Derby has also bagged first and second prizes for short-horn cows, four firsts and one second for sheep, and a first and second prize for pigs. Rosebery is a man of great versatility.

The Local Government Board has issued a circular which has been sent to the local authorities throughout the United King-

dom warning them of recrudescence of cholera on the continent and urging the necessity of taking all the possible precautions against the re-appearance of the disease in Great Britain.

The intention of the authorities in Bangor (Wales) to prosecute a drunk and disorderly man who threatened the Prince of Wales there on July 14th, has been abandoned at the Prince's request. The Prince thought that the man was sufficiently punished by the rough treatment he received from the crowd.

Joseph Chamberlain presiding at a private conference of the Unionists at Birmingham spoke hopefully of the ultimate re-union of the Liberal party, to which, he said, events were plainly pointing. In these circumstances he advised his colleagues the Unionists, to modify their tone and attitude toward the Gladstonians.

AUSTRALIA.

The elections in New South Wales have resulted in the defeat of the Government the return of 59 free traders, 88 protectionists, and 28 labor members.

FOREIGN.

Thirteen men and women, who were working in a field near Schwotz, West Prussia, were killed by lightning Saturday.

A despatch from Mequines, Morocco, says ex-Grand Vizir Half Anasati; his brother, Mohammed Soreier, and two other court officials have been arrested for plotting the murder of the Sultan.

The German Bundestrath in rejecting the act for the repeal of the Jesuit expulsion laws, exempts the Redemptorist and White Fathers from a clause of the act decreeing their exile.

A despatch received at Shanghai from Seoul reports that Japanese soldiers have assaulted the British Consulate and his wife at that place, and that blue jackets have been landed to guard the British Legation.

It is claimed that the government officials at Constantinople are concealing the real number of victims of the recent earthquakes, in order to create no unnecessary alarm among the populace. In Stamboul alone the death roll amounts to over 200. The damage done to property is computed at £4,000,000.

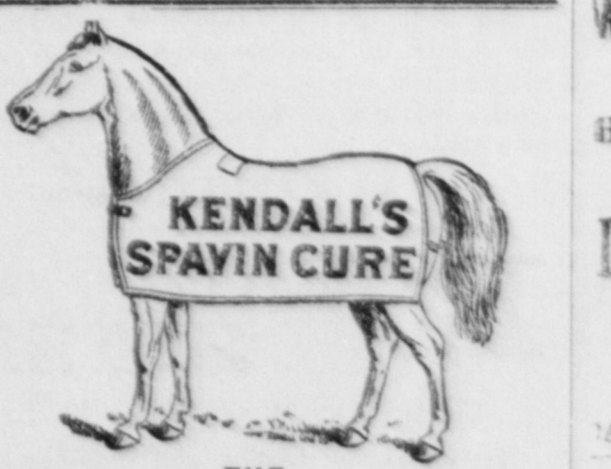
Five cases of genuine cholera have been discovered in or near Dantzic since July 13. Two of the afflicted persons, both children, have died. Several cases of Cholera are reported at Schliditz and Neufahrwasser, the latter a village of West Prussia, and it is reported that a woman has died of cholera at Hader, in North Holland.

A rainmaker in India has an apparatus, in the shape of a rocket, which is capable of rising to the height of a mile. It contains a reservoir of ether. In its descent it opens a parachute, which causes it to come slowly. The ether, thrown out in fine spray, absorbs the heat and lowers the temperature, and a limited shower is the result of the rapid condensation of vapor.

The North German Lloyd and the Hamburg lines have joined in the ocean route war and made a rate of \$10 to all British ports, thus meeting the lowest eastward rate made up to this time. Neither line has made any change in its rates westward. Outgoing steamers are now crowded with passengers who wish to take advantage of the reduced rates.

Two ladies of the American Presbyterian mission canton were mobbed recently. They had found a "heathen Chinese" expiring in the streets of that city and were endeavoring with smelling bottles and other feminine apparatus to revive him. Some brother Chinamen happened along and appeared to see a cause for their countryman's fit in the means being taken to revive him, with the result that the ladies were badly beaten and one of them may die.

Cholera continues to spread with alarming rapidity throughout St. Petersburg. Sunday there were 218 fresh cases and 69 deaths reported. From July 8th till Sunday at noon there were 875 cases 294 deaths reported. Sunday the metropolitan assisted by the clergy prayed publicly in St. Isaac cathedral that the progress of the epidemic might be stayed. Hundreds of cholera cases are reported from the provinces. The percentage of deaths is very high.
