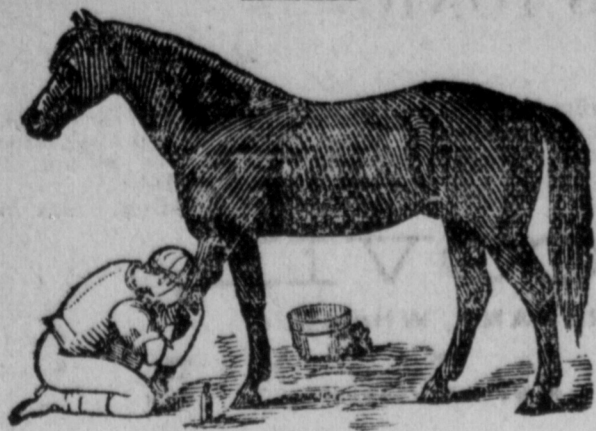

NOW TO EXTERMINATE HIM

Japanese Physician Discovers the Bacillus of the Plague.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 21.—News from Hong Kong, received to-day, shows that Dr. Kitato, of the Japan imperial medical commission, has discovered the true bacillus of the plague that has slain its thousands in Canton and Hong Kong.

Kitato has studied under Koch and is the foremost biologist of Japan. He declares that the bacillus of the plague which develops in all patients and ravages the internal organs, is distinct from any ever found before. It resembles the Hühner cholera bacterium found in animals only. The bacillus consists of slender, short, straight filaments.

Kitato bred these bacilli and inoculated several animals with the virus. Every animal developed plague, symptoms and died. The experiments showed clearly the bacilli were generated in filth and that patients who led clean lives recovered. One doctor wore clothes of an infected patient, but escaped the disease.

Kitato and his associate, Prof. Aoyama are experimenting with bactericides which may expel this deadly bacillus from the human system, as if it once secures firm lodgment the patient is doomed. The doctors agree that the Hong Kong plague is identical with the great plague of London and with the Astrakhan plague of five years ago.

The circumstances are somewhat peculiar. Garfield had been reading about the bullet-proof shields recently tested in Germany. He concluded to make one like them and, having completed it, he put it on and asked his brother to fire a shot at him. The little brother performed the request.

The bullet went through the shield and pierced the boy's heart. The shield was made out of a coffee sack and filled with scraps of old barbed wire and wool. The accident drove the mother of the boy insane.

DIED IN RAGS.

Excited Public Pity For Many Years.

Plummer Jewell, the Miser, was Worth Over \$100,000—Had Seventeen Bank Books and \$300 in His Attic Room.

MANCHESTER, N. H., July 21.—This city has a genuine sensation to-night in the discovery that Plummer Jewell, apparently one of the most poverty stricken and miserable of God's children, and who died June 18, had left property to the value of more than \$100,000.

The disclosures of to-day call to mind the fact that for years he has practically been a miser and has been hoarding up money.

He always bought the cheapest of everything, and it is stated that he never paid over \$1 a pair for pants. He had a coat which he had worn for 40 years.

He always dressed in the shabbiest manner, and, when he was seen on the streets, attracted pity from nearly everybody. For some time previous to his death he had nothing really fit to wear.

For the past year and a half he had been confined to his boarding place at 4 West Brook street. He occupied an attic room, in which he had resided exactly eight years to a day when he died. He was 76 years old, and his demise was due to apoplexy.

It was only a short time before he died that the family with whom he was boarding became aware that he had money. He was unable to get down town, and he finally asked one of the inmates of the house to go to Merrimac River savings bank and draw some money for him. He gave her a bank book and she did the errand.

She was surprised beyond measure to find the amount of the deposit was considerably over \$1,000. At the time she supposed that this was all the money he had in the world.

Jewell died on June 18. After his death a search was made of the room, and seventeen bank books were found. The sums on deposits in these institutions, it has now been ascertained, amount to over \$45,000. The books were on banks in this city, Lawrence and Concord.

In nearly all of the books it had been years and years since the interests and dividends had been added. One of the books, which contained a deposit of about \$2,000, had no interest charged since 1848.

With the interest and dividend added in all of the books to the deposits the aggregate will foot up to the magnificent sum of over \$100,000.

Three hundred dollars in cash was found in his room.

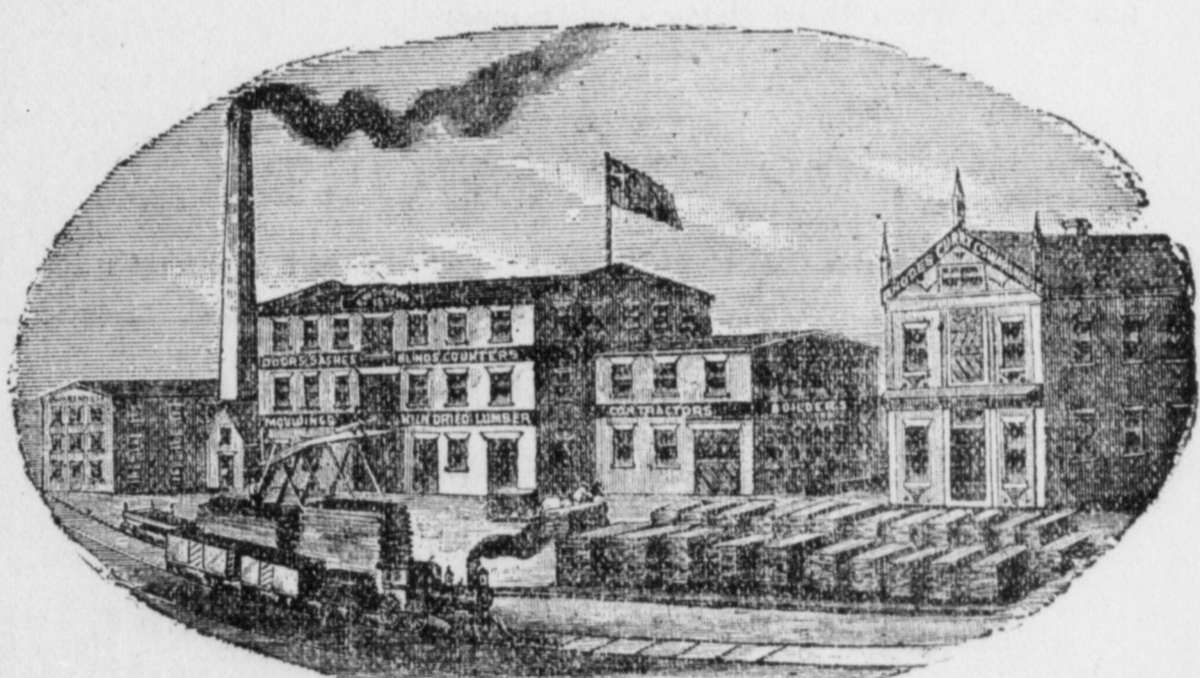
