A BACKDOWN.

The resolutions passed by the Kent and York County Councils have led to the adoption of similar resolutions by the Municipal Councils of other counties, and as a result Mr. Blair has halted in his work of unloading provincial burdens on the municipalities. His move in getting rid of the cost of maintaining the pauper insane by calling on the municipalities to assume the burden, has called forth vigorous protests from all quarters and he has found it prudent to order a retreat. He has, accordingly, forwarded a letter to the authorities of the different counties of the province, informing them that through an error on the part of the superintendent, the lists sent out were not correctly made out, and that therefore no assessment need be made for the current year for the purpose of meeting the charges thereby imposed. "The error," he writes, "arose through a misunderstanding of the law on the part of Dr. Steeves, and in the hurry of preparation so as to place the lists in the hands of the municipal authorities in good for the annual sessions of the Councils, the lists were made out to largely include a class of patients not intended to be made chargeable upon the municipalities, and in some instances did not include patients who were intended to be included therein." The lists, he declares, were not submitted to the Commissioners of the Asylum for inspection before being distributed. The explanation offered by the Attorney General is exceedingly lame. Does anyone for a moment imagine that Dr. Steeves would assume the duties of the Asylum Commissioners, and upon his own responsibility send out lists without even consulting the other members of the board. Such an admission does not speak well for the efficient management of the institution. As to "the hurry of preparation," the list was not presented to the authorities in Kent County until the latter part of January, nearly a fortnight after the Council had adjourned. The preparation of the lists must indeed have been an arduous task when a whole month was required for the work, and then a plea of "hurry of preparation" put forward. The truth is Mr. Blair has become alarmed at the storm of disapproval which the publication of these lists has called

The Judges of the Supreme Court of Canada last week answered the six questions submitted for their consideration concerning the Manitoba School Act. This Act was passed in 1890, and was bitterly opposed by the Roman Catholics of that province, more especially by the French Roman Catholics, who regarded it as a direct blow aimed at the French language in Manitoba and the North West. The Act was attacked in the courts on the ground that it was unconstitutional, and at the same time an appeal was made to the Governor General in Council to disallow it. A test case was carried from court to court, and at last the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, the highest court of appeal, decided that the Act did not "prejudicially effect any right or privilege with respect to denominational schools which any class of persons had by law or practice in the province at the union." After this decision, which reversed the judgement of the Supreme Court of Canada, the opponents of the act renewed their application to the Gov. ernor General in Council for disallowance. The Minister of Justice declined to accede to the wishes of the applicants, giving as a reason that it had been decided by the highest court that no rights held by the Roman Catholics at the time of the union had been prejudicially effected. He however submitted to the Supreme Court six questions agaling with the contention advanced by the applicants that certain privileges acquired since the union had been taken away by the Act, and asked whether the government had the power to make the remedial order asked for. A majority of the Court held that the government had no jurisdiction whatever in the matter. Under this decision no possible ground is left the government for interference. The only course left open to the petitioners is an appeal to the Privy Council. It is mentioned as a curious feature of the decision that Judge Taschereau a French Roman Catholic decided with the majority, while Judge King, the author of the New Brunswick School Act supported the contentions of the peti-

A Gloucester County Case. On motion of Mr. C. N. Skinner, Q. C., an injunction order with leave to move for an injunction later was granted this afternoon by Judge Palmer in the matter of William R. Johnson vs. John Windsor and the Bank of Montreal. Mr. Johnson is a merchant carrying on business at Bathurst, while Mr. Windsor also carried on a general business at Petit Rocher and the canning business at Petit Rocher, Nigado, Eel Brook and Miscou Island. Windsor became indebted to the Bank of Montreal at different times until last the bank had acquired the ownership and possession of all Windsor's property. To prevent depreciation and a sacrifice of the property the bank consented to Windsor's using the said property and to advance the necessary money to carry on the business for 1893 provided some third person would come in and accept drafts which the bank would discount and give the proceeds to carry on the business. An agreement was entered into between Johnson and Windsor by which Johnson was to accept drafts not to except \$6,000, and Windsor was to manufacture all the goods he could and hand them over to Johnson for sale.
