—Mr. and Mrs. T. F. Curran entertained a number of young people at a party last Thursday evening.
—The thermometer dropped to 20° below zero last Thursday night. A high wind made it appear much colder.

—The Kent Circuit Court opens here on the 13th, Judge Hannington will be in attendance. The docket will be small.
—With both the B. & M. Railway and the Kent Northern snowed under, Kent County appears to be shut out in the cold.
—Messrs. G. W. Robertson & Co. deny the report published in the Times that they will not do business here next summer.
—The St. John Globe in noting the arrival of Hon. Peter Mitchell in St. John, says he will be a candidate for Northumberland at the next Federal election.

—The ground hog that came out Candlemas day, and saw his shadow, did well to get back into his hole again. There has been some very cold weather since.
—Inspector Mercereau will visit the schools in Beresford and Bathurst, Gloucester County in February, and the schools in New Bandon, Carquet, Shippegan and Inkerman in March.
—The Buctouche & Moncton Railway has suspended business for the rest of the winter. Both engines and several cars are now at St. Anthony station, blocked by ice which has submerged the track to a depth of two or three feet for several miles.

—Hon. G. W. Howlan, the new governor of P. E. Island, is an Irishman by birth, and in religion a Roman Catholic. He has been a prominent politician for thirty years, and retires from the senate to accept his new position. He is fifty-nine years old.
—The Methodist ministers at their meeting in St. John, Monday, decided to present a petition to the Provincial Legislature at its next session asking for a plebiscite on the question of prohibition. Rev. Messrs. Paisley, Shenton and Campbell were appointed a committee to prepare the petition.

—The extension of the smelt fishing season did not help out the fishermen to any great extent, as very few smelts were caught during the week. The total catch of Kent County this season was not more than two-thirds as large as last winter. Poles and smelt houses have been removed and the river wears a deserted appearance.
—Attention is directed to Mr. D. D. Johnston's advt. in another column. Mr. Johnston is known as one of the best horse-shoers in the County. In addition to this branch of business, he is prepared to make and repair all kinds of vehicles, having secured the services of Mr. William Taylor, a first-class mechanic, late of Petitcodiac, N. B.

—The postmaster at Dorchester has for some time been missing stamps and cash from the office and last week employed a watchman and caught the thief, who proved to be a young Frenchman named LeBlanc, who has heretofore borne a good character. A number of keys, some of which belonged to the post office, were found in his possession.
—The many friends of Mr. Wm. O. McInerney will be pleased to hear that he has been recently promoted to the lucrative position of one of the editors of the Associated Press in New York. Mr. McInerney is a graduate of St. Joseph's College, Memramcook, and although young in journalistic life has already displayed great literary attainments.

—As the proposed new hall for Kingston is at last taking definite form, and therefore all the funds available will soon be needed, those who have subscribed will confer a favor by paying in their subscriptions to the treasurer, Mr. A. B. Carson, as soon as convenient. Subscriptions from others who are interested in the hall, and who have not already subscribed will be thankfully received.
—The blockade of the Kent Northern Railway compels the smelt buyers to ship their fish via Harcourt. A number of teams started out with loads Friday. The weather was extremely cold, the roads drifted full and some of the teamsters were pretty heavily frozen when they reached their destination. One young man, Warman, had both feet frozen, while several had their ears, cheeks and chins frozen.

—Barque Mary E. Chapman went ashore Saturday night on Stone Horse reef, off Tybee Island, and became a total wreck. The Chapman, Capt. Kyffin, sailed from Rotterdam Dec 27 for Tybee. She was a vessel of 660 tons register, was built at Rockland, N. B., in 1873, and was owned by Messrs. Chas. A. Palmer, Thos. Kyffin and J. W. Scamell. She was partly insured. The captain's wife was on board.—Globe.
