Saw Her Lover Die.

NASHUA, April 23.—Miss Grace Parker of Lynn, over whom in a fit of jealousy Samuel H. Sawyer committed suicide at Hotel Dexter, to-day in an interview gives the following as the reasons for the act: "It all grew out of my black eye." "We were to be married, but our circumstances were such that we decided to wait." "I was to go back to Lynn in the shoe shop and he to stay in Nashua." "We grew confidential and I told him of going to ride with a mutual friend last winter to endeavor to patch up a row between us." "He became angry and hit me in the eye and choked me." "He then became sorry at once and wanted to die for using me so." "He went out from the hotel and I was alone." "He came back and entered into conversation with me, suggesting that we both take a drink of chloral and end our lives together." "He said it was the easiest way out of it."

"I did not think he would take it." "He took off his hat, put it on the table and sat down on the trunk." "He then took the tumbler and filled it with the stuff from the bottle." "He said, 'You will go home.'" "Then he asked me if I would take a drink of chloral with him. I told him I was afraid to die, I was not fit to leave the world." "He said, 'Grace, we will take it together. We will get along all right.'" "I replied, 'For God's sake, Sam don't do that.'" "He said, 'I won't.'" "Then I kissed him and he went out for a few minutes, but soon returned." "This was about 11 o'clock, and as he came in he asked me for the bottle of chloral. We talked over the plan of suicide and he drank the dose."

"After he took it he lay down on the bed, as you see, and I became frightened and as quickly as possible notified the proprietor, who summoned Dr. Anthoine." "It was too late; the doctor could not revive him and he died in a short time." She said she had been keeping him company more or less for a number of years in Lynn.

Miss Parker is in charge of policeman Ross Duffy at the hotel where she and Sawyer had lived together two days.

Mrs. Woods, a near relative of Sawyer, visited her this afternoon and denounced her in the strongest language, making quite a scene.
