

LOCAL NEWS.

THE B. & M. RAILWAY.—During the week and next, trains will run on the Buctouche and Moncton railway on Mondays, Thursdays, and Saturdays only. This arrangement will continue for two weeks when the daily train service will be re-established.

THE BUCTOUCHE BRIDGE.—Mr. Haines of the public works department, Fredericton, was in Buctouche, Thursday, examining the Buctouche great road bridge. A couple of the abutments and the draw are slightly in need of repair and it is fixed now will probably save a much greater expense in a year or two.

DEPARTURES.—The schooner Henry Swan, purchased recently by Capt. Geo. Shand, sailed Saturday morning for Picton. Capt. Shand has a contract to carry fifteen hundred tons of coal to the Miramichi.—The schooner Matilda, Capt. Thomas Haines, sailed on Monday for the north to load herring.

BARNES VS. CANADIAN EXPRESS CO.—Mr. R. W. Hewson, of the firm of Teed, Hewson and Hanington leaves the first of the week for Montreal. The object of Mr. Hewson's visit to that city is to take the evidence in the case of James Barnes vs the Canadian Express Co. which comes up sometime next month at Richibucto, Kent Co. The plaintiff in this case charges the defendant with preventing sale of several barrels of oysters shipped to Montreal which are alleged to have been placed in a car containing a quantity of lime.—Transcript.

BARK CHRISTIAN WILHELM.—The bark Christian Wilhelm, bound to Richibucto was wrecked on the Irish coast in the late storm. A cable dispatch says:—The Norwegian bark Christian Wilhelm from a continental port for a port in New Brunswick missed stays while trying to get off the coast and was carried ashore. The heavy sea that was running caused her to pound her bottom. She is a total wreck. The life boat men succeeded in getting everybody ashore safely. The Christian Wilhelm visited this port several times. She was here last summer. She is commanded by Captain Kverndal.

ACCIDENT AT BUCTOUCHE.—Mr. Edward Barnes, of Buctouche, son of Mr. James Barnes, the well known contractor, met with a very painful accident in Buctouche on Monday. The young man left home early in the morning on a goose shooting expedition, taking with him a Winchester repeating rifle and a seven shooter. He discharged one cartridge, and was in the act of ejecting the shell when a cartridge which had in some unaccountable way forced itself from the breech lock, exploded, the powder flashing into the face of the young man, burning it badly, besides injuring one of his eyes. His injuries are not likely to prove serious.—Times.
