#### Newfoundland Notes.

Following fast on the failure of the seal fishery has come one of the most severe and trying political crises that was everexperienced in any British colony. To understand it fully one must know something of the past history and present position of the colony.

The fishermen that first landed on the shores of Newfoundland did so in spite of the wealthy merchants that controlled the trade of the island. The latter were determined that the attention of the men should not be diverted from the fisheries and the most outrageous cruelty was practised on the bold men who dared disobey the orders of their masters. At length the British Government was correctly informed as to the facts and put a stop to this persecution. The settlements of the island gradually increased till people were allowed a system of Government This, owing to the ignorance and poverty of the fishermen was, however, almost entirely in the hands of the merchats. To oppose their will meant starvation for the people were hemmed in by the sea and could not escape. A fisherman's party was, however, formed in opposition to that of the merchants and the strife waxed warm. At last the passage of the ballo act put into the hands of the fishermen the golden opportunity, and in 1889 the merchants sustained a severe defeat. Sir William Whieway was returned to power

men government showed more anxiety to secure a goodly share of the spoils than to conserve the rights of the class that put them there. They were fast losing their popularity when the great fire of St. Johns occurred. The influx of money caused a great expansion of trade and the government made the most of it as was natural. They also arranged for the construction of a railways across the island. This was a most excellent idea and one that contained the germ of future prosperity. They however made a most serious mistake in the location of the road owing it is said largely to the misrepresentation of certain facts by the surveyors who were entrusted with the task of reporting on the country through which it passed. The road instead of being some two hundred miles in length was made to be over five hundred miles in length. The house of Assembly having expired by limitation of time the election last fall was largely run on the question of a continuation of the railway policy of Andrew Burgess and his brother Thomas The Whiteway party. A close and hot contest followed in which the Whiteway government was well sustained. During the contest however, the government used the public funds in the most unblushing manner to secure their own return to power. Thousands of men were employed on the roads and other public works up to the very day of polling and as soon as their votes were polled, discharged. The mail steamers were taken off the routes and used for the convenience of the government candidates. A host of needy parasites were fed at the expense of the colony. It cost according to the accounts nearly one hundred and fifty thousand dollars to hold an election for a Mr. Calder spencer of this place, left colony of two hundred thousand people.
