The Murphys the Largest Irish Tribe. On surnames in Ireland a special report has been issued, with notes as to numerical strength, derivation, ethnology and distribution, as a parliamentary blue book. The volume is full of curious information, gathered together evidently at very considerable pains. It shows, among other things, that Murphy is the commonest surname in Ireland, there being no fewer than 62,600 persons, or 13.3 per 1000 of the population, so called, and the next in order in numerical strength are Kelly, 55,900; Sullivan, 43,600; Walsh, 41,700; Smith, 33,700; O'Brien, 33,400, and Byrne, 38,300. In a chapter on the derivation of surnames, there are examples like the following: McFadden, derived from Mac-Paidin, (Irish), son of little Patrick; O'Toole, from O'Tuathail, the descendant of Tuathal; Kibbride, from Giolla Brigbhid the servant of St. Bridget; Gilchrist, from Giolla Chruid, the servant of Christ; McIntyre, from Mac-an-t-Saon, the son of the workman; while the usual peculiarities occur in surnames derived from locality, personal peculiarities, etc. In many cases the descendants of the ancient families are still domiciled in the same tract as their forefathers, and on this point we have that the MacCabs were a warlike clan, originally from County Monaghan; the MacCarlys were anciently kings and princes of the county Cork and elsewhere; the MacDermotts were ancient princes, their chief fortress being on an island in Lough Key, near Boyle; the O'Doughertys were a powerful sept in county Donegal, and so on with many others.

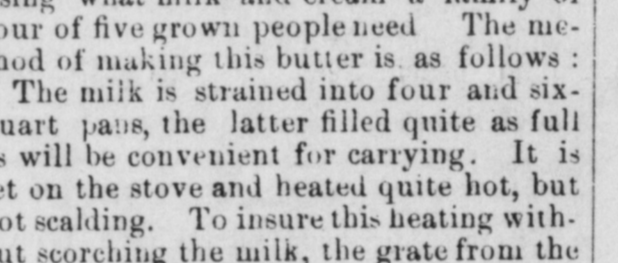
Making Butter in a Small Way. Now-a-days there is so much said and written about creamy butter that one is apt to forget that in hundreds of homes women are making butter in a small way just as their grandmothers did. Last January I was visiting at a farm home and my hostess churned in a most primitive fashion—stirring the cream in a tin pail with a ladle. As she has Jersey cows it does not take her long to bring the butter and she thinks it much easier to stir the cream than to bother with a churn. This churning produced ten pounds.

My friend has two fresh cows and one that had been milked for some time. From these she made from fifteen to twenty pounds of butter per week after using what milk and cream a family of four or five grown people need. The method of making this butter is as follows:

The milk is strained into four and six quart pails, the latter filled quite as full as will be convenient for carrying. It is set on the stove and heated quite hot, but not scalding. To insure this heating without scorching the milk, the grate from the oven is first placed on the stove. During cold weather there were about five milkings, standing all the time. In warmer weather the milk is skimmed much closer. The churning is done twice a week. The butter is worked but twice, the salt—about a teaspoon to eight pounds—being put in at the first working.—Housewife, in Ohio Farmer.

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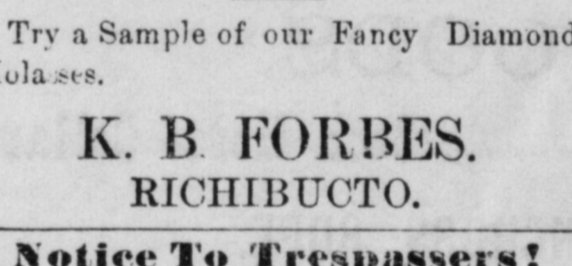
